

The Madcap Duchess.

There was no merrier madcap at ne Princess of Wales. As a child she ten vowed that she would be a duchss, and at an early age she brought o her feet the Duke of Hamilton. A cheming aunt, however, who hated the Hamiltons, intercepted the Duke's letters, thereby causing misunderstandings, which ended the romance. Then the Hon. Augustus Hervey, second heir to the Earldom of Bristol, fell under her spell, and, smarting with esentment at the Duke's coldness lizabeth eloped with the Hon. Augusus, and was quietly married at dead of night, the ceremony being performed by the light of a taper concealed in the pest man's hat. Hervey, being a naval lieutenant, was called away to Portsmouth immediately to rejoin his ship. Soon afterwards she was running over the Continent in search of distraction leaving a twain of broken hearts and languishing lovers behind her. At Berlin, she had the great Frederick himself at her knees; at the Dresden Court she shocked the ladies and bewitched the men: then back again to England to tear the page out of the marriage register recording her marriage. So she went on until nearly fifty years of age, her ambition to become a duchess still unquenched. She enslaved the aged Duke of Kingston, and by a lavish use of brides and cajolery, obtained a sentence from the Ecclesiastical Court annulling her marriage with Hervey, she blossomed into "the most high and puissante Princess, the Duchess of Kingston." When the aged duke died, she soon flung away her widow's weeds, and plunged into the vortex of London gaiety. When these palled she bought a yacht and sailed to Rome, where Pope and Cardinals did her honor. She was once saved from eloping with a titled swindler by his arrest and later suicide in prison.
