be dated from the time when Drake put down his first well at Titusville Pa., in 1859. That does not mean to say that petroleum was unknown before then, for we have references to it even in the Bible, and the ancient Fire Worshippers of Peru undoubtedly

Ever since Drake's well was sunl sixty-four years ago, oil operators have been forging ahead all over the world, wherever geologists have thought there is a chance of oil.

When a likely spot has been settled upon, a derrick-a tower-like structure—is erected over the place This is made of either wood or steel, and tapers up from a base sixteen to twenty-four feet square to a four foot square at the top, eighty to one hundred and thirty feet above. Round the sides at the bottom are various sheds housing drilling machines and wheels.

Cables, passing over pulleys at the top of the derrick, are wound on drums on these wheels, and they are used for drilling and for pulling tools or lifting casing out of the hole.

#### All Done by Drilling.

For drilling with this system, which is called the percussion, or standard, method, the cable, with the drillingbit attached, is clamped to a strong beam, which is given an up-and-down stroke by means of a crank at the other end. 


