

The Governor-General.

We stated on Saturday on the strength of a despatch that the Governor-General intended to visit Guelph on Thursday, being the chief day of the Exhibition. We regret to learn that this despatch was sent under a misapprehension. One of the members of the Government waited on His Excellency on Saturday morning in reference to his coming to Guelph, and being in the belief that our Central Exhibition was held in the same week as the Western Fair at London, the conclusion was arrived at that His Excellency could easily attend the two. When, however, it was explained later in the day that the Guelph Show was held this week, His Excellency said that it was impossible for him to be present, as he had arranged to meet Sir Edward Thornton, British Minister at Washington, at Niagara Falls this week. When business would keep them engaged for some days. He expressed more than once his extreme regret that he was unable to visit Guelph, and see the Central Exhibition, but promised if spared to another year to come without fail. We regret very much that His Excellency is unable to come and see our good Town and our Show, but we have done all we could to bring this about, and must now be content to live in the hope of having him in our midst next year.

We may state that His Worship the Mayor, and Mr. James Laidlaw, representing the Agricultural Society, who went to Toronto to invite the Governor-General to come to Guelph met with every possible courtesy, and more than once His Excellency expressed his regret that he could not possibly attend.

We are happy, however, to be able to announce that His Excellency the Lieut. Governor of Ontario will positively visit Guelph on Thursday, when we are sure he will get a right loyal and warm reception from our citizens and the thousands of strangers who will be in Town on that day.

GUELPH CENTRAL EXHIBITION.

Monday morning, Sept. 30.
This being the first day of the Exhibition week, there is of course not as yet the furious stir and bustle that will likely occur on the day closes, but even now workmen are busy preparing for the reception of their employer's various articles that are to be exhibited.

Crowe an assortment of metal vases.

The poultry are but as yet sparsely represented, whilst in the grain and roots department, exhibitors are very backward in coming forward. The entries approximate 6,000, pretty much the same as last year. As we left the grounds towards noon exhibitors were coming in plentifully and doubtless ere night the different Superintendents of Departments will have their energies severely enough tried to find accommodation for all anxious to find sufficient space for the proper display of their various entries.

In consequence of the large number of entries for cattle, the Directors have had to increase the accommodation in this section, and by this evening it is hoped the building will be completed. The new erection will accommodate about 100 more head. The grounds are in excellent order, and should the weather prove propitious, no doubt there will be a large attendance of visitors. Already the Town gives promise of this in the increased number of strangers visible in our streets, and, as we before remarked, the hotel keepers are busy making preparations sufficient to cover the great influx of strangers that are likely to pour into Guelph during the next four or five days.

Proposed New County.
MEETING AT ORANGEVILLE.
We learn from the Orangeville papers that an influential meeting of the ratepayers of Orangeville was held in the Town Hall on Monday evening, for the purpose of discussing the propriety of adopting measures to erect the municipalities in Simcoe, Grey and Wellington, which are contiguous to each other, but remote from their present County town into a new County, with Orangeville as its capital. The meeting, which had been called by the Reeve, in compliance with a numerously signed requisition, was well attended, about 250 persons being present. The Reeve, Mr. M. McCarthy, presided as chairman, and Mr. J. Foley acted as Secretary.

Several speeches were made in favor of the movement; and Mr. S. H. McKittrick moved the following resolution:—"That it is the opinion of this meeting that the time has arrived when the municipalities of Mono, Mulum, Melancthon, Amaranth, Luther and East Garafraxa should be formed into a new county for judicial and municipal purposes, and that a Central Committee be now appointed to promote the said County formation."

Mr. R. McKeown seconded the resolution. The resolution was put to the meeting and carried unanimously.

The Nova Scotia Exodus.
In 1867 and 1868, the first two years of confederation, there was a very large emigration of the young men of Nova Scotia to the United States. At the time we were told that this exodus was in consequence of confederation, and afforded indisputable evidence that Nova Scotia had been ruined by union with Canada and was no longer fit to live in. But the exodus still goes on in an unabated stream. Now, however, it is not Confederation which drives the young men to seek their fortunes in the United States. The journals which were formerly the most bitterly opposed to Confederation admit that there are other causes. One journal alleges that the people of Nova Scotia are "fast becoming noted for roving merely for the love of roving itself," and thus many of them leave the Province who have no intention of residing abroad.

Troops for Manitoba.
Collingwood, Sept. 28.—The contingents from the several military districts for the North West Expedition, commenced to arrive here on Tuesday afternoon. Each succeeding train brought its quota up to Thursday at noon, at which time the last detachment from Quebec arrived. Lieutenant-Colonel Wiley was here in advance with camp equipage, and on the arrival of the first troop a camp was formed, rations issued, and the ordinary routine of camp life proceeded with. On Wednesday morning the issue of uniforms, underclothing, and necessities, arms, accoutrements, knapsacks, blankets and other appointments was proceeded with. As both officers and men worked with a will, by Thursday evening all were ready for embarkation. At half-past three o'clock on Friday the order came from Ottawa to sail by the *Francis Smith* for Thunder Bay, from whence the expedition will proceed to Fort Garry by the Dawson route. They expect to meet the troops returning at Shebandowan, when Lieutenant-Colonel Villiers and Lamontagne, who accompanied the expedition, will return. One hour only was consumed in striking and packing tents and all other stores. The troops fell into marching order, and left camp so as to march aboard the vessel at five o'clock, where Lieut. Col. Jackson handed over the command to Lieut. Col. Osborne Smith. The whole force numbered about 250.
