FATAL RESULT OF INTemperance.

A sad example of the ruinous effects of intoxication appeared in the death, on Tuesday night of Nicholas Lutz, of Hamilton. After searching some time she found him lying on Catherine street almost insensible from a bruise he had received on the head. She immediately carried him home and did what she could to relieve his sufferings, which were great. He continued to grow worse, however, giving off quantities of blood from the mouth and nose, and at four o'clock he expired. It seems he had been drinking considerably through the day and evening and overcame his influence he fell on the sidewalk with such force that he died from the concussion given to the brain. The body was examined on Wednesday night, and an inquest was held, when a verdict was rendered in accordance with the facts.

A Night in a Snow Drift.

Last night, between 7 and 8 o'clock, Mr. Elliott, procured a span of horses and cutter from Mr. George Patterson's livery stable here, and in crossing the railway track, on the West Market Square, the cutter upset, and the horses ran off. Mr. Elliott went in pursuit, but could get no track of them. He returned and got assistance and continued the search all night, and has not yet returned. Mr. L. Lowry found the horses, this morning, stuck in a snow drift in a lane near the Sheriff's farm, about four and a half miles from Guelph. With great difficulty he released the animals, drove them into town, and gave them into the owner's possession. Mr. Patterson said that the animals were in much better trim than he expected to find them, although the high horse was pretty badly cut on the hind leg. The off horse escaped unhurt. The poor brutes must have suffered terribly during the intense cold of last night, with nothing to protect them, and stuck in a snow bank, and rendered useless. Of course it is impossible to form any estimate of the loss just now.

A Good Move.

The press of New York City is agitating for a reform in the shape of doing away with telegraph poles, and laying the lines on underground wires. It is proposed to use a lighter wire made of copper, since it does not require strength to meet the strain of its own weight between widely separated supports. Every electrician knows the enormous advantage this would give to the telegraph, because of the remarkable conducting power of copper.

Practical Joke.

The Ottawa Citizen says—Last night two druggist clerks played a practical joke on a man named Harlem, who was saving wood on Biddle Street. The man had a bottle of "eye" secured in a snow bank along side of a pile of wood, and occasionally took a "hooker." One of the clerks saw where he put the bottle, and while his back was turned secured it, and carried it to a druggist's shop, where he mixed it with two ounces of red pepper, and laid it back. The woodman presently went for another drink, but only swallowed two mouthfuls before he felt the effect. He threw the bottle down in a hurry, and howling like a Sioux Indian in a war dance, stuck his head in the snow. The pepper now began to work in his interior, and he became worse. Tears fell in a shower from his eyes, and he rubbed his eyes with his hands. He felt confident that some one had poisoned him, and he walked over his approaching dissolution most pitifully. He was taken to a neighboring hotel, and compelled to swallow a powerful purgative. He has recovered from the dose, but he doesn't carry a bottle of whiskey with him any more.

Mr. Harris' Letter.

The report of the Finance Committee, which we published in our issue of Wednesday, was based upon the following letter. In order that our readers may judge of the position taken by the Committee we publish the letter in full: To the Mayor and Council of the Town of Guelph. GENTLEMEN.—The petition of Board of Roman Catholic School Trustees of the Town of Guelph respectfully sheweth: That the united Board of Grammar and Public School Trustees of the Town laid their estimate before your Honourable Council, asking a grant for School purposes for the present year the sum of seven thousand five hundred and eighty-four dollars and that you have granted their request, and to raise said amount you have levied a rate of four mills on the dollar on \$1,606,794 being amount of rateable property of the supporters of said School which would only produce \$6,427; deduct from that amount \$302 for collection, 2 per cent, and losses and remissions 2 7/10ths per cent, being the amount of losses and remissions as per approximate estimate of your Honourable Council's finance report, and 4 per cent on \$5753 advanced to said board before collection of the Town rates amounting to \$230, would reduce the amount realized to \$5,895, showing that you have granted to said union School Board from the general funds of the Town the sum of \$189. The late Separate School Act, assented to 5th May, 1863, decides that these things are to be settled; Section 29 of said Act says: "Every Separate School shall be entitled to a share of the fund annually granted by the Legislature of this Province for the support of Common Schools, and shall be entitled also to share in all other public grants, investments or allotments for Common School purposes now made or hereafter to be made by the Province, or the municipal authorities, according to the average number of children attending such School during the twelve next preceding months, or during the number of months which may have elapsed from the establishment of a new Separate School as compared with the whole average number of pupils attending school in the same City, Town, Village or Township."
