TOCKHOLM, July 15-The last day of the track and field sports in the stadium brought no sensations. The games reached their culmination in the Marathon. The curtain falls on the Olympic with the United States well in front in the total points of all sports and with a sweeping victory in the field and track events which for years have constituted the program at meetngs in America and Great Britain and to which athletes of those nations devote their energies.

The bestowal of the prizes by the king, who placed laurely wreaths on the heads of the victors and shook hands with all the winners, took place in the stadium this afternoon. The American :eam led the march of triumphal athletes which, when arrayed before the king, formed an assemblage of picked men and women of the world in sport such as was never seen in one body before.
