

ALASKAN HUNTERS DIE OF COLD AND HUNGER

Juneau Residents Hunting Without Blankets or Provisions

Juneau, Alaska, Sept. 16-The bodies of Leslie Oliver, John Shattuck and Dell Linscott, young men of Juneau and Douglas, who went hunting Thursday, September 5, on Sheep Creek Mountain and who became lost in a dense fog, were found yesterday on the mountain. They had per-ished from hunger, cold and exposure

The body of Leslie Oliver, 17 years old, was found about half a mile from the summit of the mountain and above the timber line. Although the body was in plain sight from the crests and ridges the searchers must have passed other fathings.
