

DARROW DEPRECIATES

DYNAMITE METHODS

So-Called "Direct Action" is Scored by Noted Labor Attorney

Asserts That Reform Will Come Only When Workingmen Stand Together

Seattle, Sept. 16.—"Direct action," as it is generally understood, or in plainer terms, "dynamite as a means of winning labor struggles," does not meet with the approval of Clarence Darrow, labor champion and attorney for the McNamara brothers, who spoke in Seattle last night on industrial conspiracies.

In discussing the future of the labor problem, Darrow declared this morning that it would never be won by that method. "I do not believe in it," he declared, "and I don't want to be understood as giving my endorsement. There are two kinds of direct action—one consisting of strikes—for they are the only weapon laboring men have and have brought them all that kind of labor holds today—but not in 'direct action' which is advocated in many quarters.

Admirer of Wilson While declining to discuss politics, Darrow frankly admitted his admiration for Gov. Woodrow Wilson of New Jersey. At the same time he confessed that he had little admiration for Roosevelt. He inquired as to the strength of the Socialists in this state, and said that in his opinion the belief of that party were gaining ground steadily. He himself, he said, had always supported the Democratic party.

Darrow last evening was given a rousing welcome by the audience which packed the Grandstand rink to hear him speak, the cheering lasting several minutes. He was introduced by George McNamara, editor of The Union Record, and spoke for more than an hour on the relation of capital to labor.

Naval Cadets Examine Ottawa, Sept. 16.—The Canada Gazette contains notice that a general competitive examination for naval cadets in the naval service in Canada will be held on Wednesday, November 13th, at a number of points in Canada, including Port Arthur, Winnipeg, Brandon, Regina, Saskatoon, Calgary, Edmonton, Nelson, Vancouver and Victoria.

Applications from intending candidates must be filed with the civil service commission on or before October 15. On November 13, civil service examinations both preliminary and qualifying will be held at the same points.

SALVATION ARMY TO MAKE ASSAULT ON CHINA

Branch of Army to be Established at Peking or Tientsin

Victoria, B. C., Sept. 16.—Col. F. Lamb, Salvation Army immigration commissioner, arrived here today on a tour of the Orient, where he has been making investigations with regard to the establishment of a Chinese branch of the army, with headquarters probably at Peking or Tientsin.

He stated that this was the great desire as well as one of the last wishes of the late Gen. Booth. He will report to the new commander recommending the establishment at an early date of the army in China.

GAYETY COST \$24,000; NOW INSANE

Queen Nicotine in Pounds Ottawa, Sept. 16.—The total weight of raw leaf tobacco used by the manufacturers of Canada in the year was 21,879,586 pounds, an increase of two million pounds over the previous year. From this there was produced 20,671,121 pounds of manufactured tobacco, 168,944,145 cigarettes, an increase of 168,000,000 in cigarettes. The number of cigars manufactured was 248,906,934, an increase of 21,500,000 over the domestic cigar production of 1911.

Chicago, Sept. 16.—Declared to have spent \$24,000 within a few months on who supports and lobster parties, a man claiming to be Count von Knobelsdorff, a member of the Austrian nobility, has been placed in the detention hospital for the insane.

According to the police he received a legacy from Germany a few months ago amounting to 100,000 marks, or about \$24,000. He formerly lived, with his wife, Martha, a concert soloist, at 824 La Salle avenue.

She sued him recently for separate maintenance, alleging that she was forced to earn her own living while he squandered his inheritance in high living. Failure to effect a reconciliation with his wife is said to have mentally unbalanced him. His wife is now said to be staying in Milwaukee.

CANADA'S CONSUMPTION OF LIQUOR AND TOBACCO

Ottawa, Sept. 16.—The annual report of the inland revenue department, issued on Saturday, contains revised figures of the liquor and tobacco production of the Dominion of Canada for the year 1911-12. The quantity of spirits produced was 4,784,388 proof gallons, nearly half a million gallons less than the production of 1911. The demand for Canadian whiskey abroad, however, last year, shows a gradual diminution from the average of the last four years. In 1908 Canada exported distillery products to the quantity of 412,569 gallons. In 1911 the export had fallen to 275,963 gallons. In 1912 the export was 298,769 gallons. The number of gallons of liquor manufactured in Canada during the fiscal year 1911-12 was 42,618,847, which may be taken as the year's consumption in this country of domestic beer and porters, as very little is exported. Of this quantity Ontario breweries produced 22,500,801 gallons; Quebec, 11,119,985; New Brunswick, 501,205; Nova Scotia, 933,917; Manitoba, 4,108,884; Saskatchewan, 848,188; Alberta, 2,677,431; British Columbia, 4,891,944, and the Yukon, 22,548 gallons.

Gang of Boys Confess Crime Butte, Mont., Sept. 16.—Fifteen boys, ranging from 12 to 15 years of age, confessed today in the juvenile court that they attempted to kidnap Joseph Meyers, a chicken farmer, after he had set fire to the Meyers home. Mrs. Meyers testified today that she and her husband had been rendered destitute by the destruction of the boys.

M. PELLETIER SAYS BORDEN WILL NOT LET HIM OUT

"I Will Stay at My Post and Continue My Work," Declares Postmaster General

Successful Banquet to French-Canadian Minister in Quebec on Saturday

Touched Lightly Upon Naval Question and Referred to Public Works

Quebec, Sept. 15.—The banquet given to the Hon. L. P. Pelletier, postmaster-general by the mayor of Quebec and the Conservatives of the county on Saturday night was one of the most successful given a public man in this district. The banquet was attended by some 275 guests. Two of the postmaster-general's fellow cabinet members were present, Hon. Dr. Reid and Hon. J. D. Hazen. The banquet was presided over by Mayor Bernier, of Levis.

Turning to newspaper predictions, Mr. Pelletier said some of them had been busy with his political disposition, even going so far as to prophesy his political death or resignation. Mr. Borden had refused to accept his resignation, even going so far as to offer to administer the post office department himself. "Providence has given me a renewal of my health," said Mr. Pelletier, "and I will stay at my post and continue my work."

Mr. Pelletier went on to describe the work done in the interest of his department while abroad, including his efforts to reduce the cable rates, which he said was the beginning of more extended success. He hoped to secure a reduction in the postal charges between France and Canada.

The defence of Canada and the empire was a duty for Canada, and a plan to carry out that duty must be formulated and this the government is intending to do.

"There are many in this district," said Mr. Pelletier, "who say the government is not proceeding fast enough with the public works in contemplation for Quebec, but those who say so are really the people who have not done or tried to do anything for Quebec."

Hon. Dr. Reid, Hon. J. D. Hazen, Dr. Paquet, M. P., and A. Seivigny, M. P., responded to the toast of "Canada," proposed by Hon. E. J. Flynn, "The Province of Quebec," brought a response from Hon. T. Chapais.

MAN WILL LIVE WITH A PATCHED BRAIN

New York, Sept. 15.—Surgeons of St. Joseph's hospital, New York, recently announced that John Martin, whose skull was badly fractured, is recovering and will live with part of his brain missing.

Martin is 28 years old. He was found unconscious on the New York Central tracks four weeks ago. His skull was badly smashed in at the forehead. Dr. Mendelssohn and Dr. Lopez, who operated upon him, found several bits of brain tissue had been torn away and were lost through the opening in the skull.

They did not believe the could live twenty-four hours, but they set to work delicately mending the torn tissues and patching the broken bones. Martin remained in a semi-conscious state for two weeks, only regaining his senses for a few minutes at long intervals. His condition has steadily improved during the past three days, and he is now conscious most of the time.

His mind is somewhat affected, but the doctors believe the defect is only temporary. His principal lack is lack of memory, which he will regain when he recovers his strength, the doctors say. Martin says that someone threw him off a passenger train.

His complete recovery is now almost certain and seems a miracle, as he has lost part of his brain and a large portion of his skull is now replaced by a plate.

ALASKAN HUNTERS DIE OF HUNGER

Juneau Residents Hunting Without Blankets or Provisions

Juneau, Alaska, Sept. 16.—The bodies of Leslie Oliver, John Shattuck and Dell Linscott, young men of Juneau and Douglas, who went hunting Thursday, September 5, on Sheep Creek Mountain and who became lost in a dense fog, were found yesterday on the mountain. They had perished from hunger, cold and exposure while endeavoring to reach the top of the mountain, where there is a mine's cabin which would have given them shelter.

The body of Leslie Oliver, 17 years old, was found about half a mile from the summit of the mountain and above the timber line. Although the bodies were in plain sight from the crests and ridges the searchers must have passed and repassed it many times. The boys' shoes were worn through by the rocks in their struggle to reach the summit. In his hand was a pistol and by his side a bowie knife. The bodies were brought to Juneau, which is in mourning.
