was seriously injured. French then ran to the river, five blocks away, pursued by several hundred citizens. He shot himself in the head and then jumped into the water. The police rescued him, and he may

The audience assembled in the school room of the Talbot Street Baptist Church last night was highly entertained by Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Grigg, returned missionaries from Burmah. In the course of a very interesting address, Mr. Grigg described the growth of the mission work started in Burmah by Rev. Mr. Judson, 83 years ago. There are now 50,000 natives of that country associated with the Baptists, apart from the followers of other de-

Mr. and Mrs. Grigg were sent out by the American Baptist Union three and a half years ago, to labor among the Chin people of Arakan, Burmah, but owing to the ill-health of Mrs. Grigg, were obliged to return to this country sooner than they intended. The Chins live in the mountains, in a very barbaric state, and twelve years ago had not been reached by the Gospel. At present there are 400 Christian Chins. 13 churches. 13 schools and 25 native teachers and preachers in connection with the Baptist society. Mr.

Important Discoveries Just Made in British Columbia.

Rossland, B. C., July 21.—Silvanite, or tulluride of gold, was discovered in the Evening Star mine at Trail Creek on Saturday, and considerable quantities of free gold. Some of the pieces of ore assayed \$1,600 to the ton in gold. A strike of importance was also made in the Monte Christo claim, adjoining the Evening Star. The City Schools.

A Large Number of Tenders for Additions and Repairs.

Opened by No. 2 Committee of the Board -Wood and Coal Tenders Dealt With.

No. 2 committee of the Board of Education had a lengthy and monotonous task last night. It was the opening of tenders for the four-room addition to Aberdeen school, for roofing Simcoe street school, and for the brickwork on Colborne street school. Tenders were also opened for coal and wood, and building closets at Victoria and Maple avenue schools. The opening of these occupied two hours and a half. There was a great difference in the prices in some cases. highest for brickwork on Aberdeen

school was \$1,400, but the lowest tender was in every case accepted. Tenders were recommended as follows: Aberdeen School-Brickwork, John Heaman & Son. \$1.067; carpenter work, Tambling & Jones, \$839; plastering, Murray Bros, \$84 50; painting, O. B. Graves, \$67; heating, Harry Boyd, \$113; metallic ceiling, W. Steve-

ly & Son. \$104. The total cost of erecting the addition, according to the above tenders, will be \$2,274 50. The appropriation set apart for this work was \$2,520. Colborne Street School-Painting, etc., Pace & Fitzgerald, \$410; carpenter work, Joseph S. Holmes, \$450.

Slating Simcoe street school roof-George Riddell, \$150. Twelve tenders were submitted for repairs (painting and kalsomining), in the different schools throughout the The tender of W. A. Westland,

\$2 35, was recommended.

The question of blackboards caused some discussion. Every member of the committee agreed that the board made by Gould & Stratfold was a good one, but the price was high. George Whittaker submitted a tender for a slate board at 28c per foot; W. Welker, a pointed composition board at 65c per square yard, and Gould & Stratfold a composition troweled surface board for \$1 per square yard. The work was divided between W. Welker and Gould & Stratfold.

The tender of W. Bowman & Co. for coal will be recommended for acceptance. The amounts required are 800 tons of soft coal and 400 tons of hard coal. The prices were as folows: Soft, \$3 50 per ton; grate, \$4 80; Children Cry for egg, stove and chestnut, \$5.
