

IN THE CYCLONE'S PATH. Fourteen People Killed by a Minnesota Storm.

Duluth, Minn., July 8. - Fourteen people are now known to have been killed in the cyclone and cloud bursts in this section of Minnesota Tuesday and Wednesday.
