He returned to London in time to meet Lord Roberts, on whose staff he is serving. He attended several smart functions with Lord Roberts, among others, a banquet at Buckingham Palace, on which occasion he was asked by the Prince of Wales to act as a guest on start of the Duke of York during the proposed Canadian tour. Major and Mrs. Denison had intended sailing for Canada on Feb. 7. All the Canadian soldiers accompanying them remain until after the funeral of the Queen.

An Interesting Case.

Before Boyd, C., and Lister J. A., in appeal.

Re Ross and Township of East Nissouri—Judgment (H.) on appeal by Alexander Ross from a judgment refusing application to quash bylaw No. 367, of East Nissouri. Bylaw 368 provides that it shall not be lawful for cattle to run at large in the township, and the bylaw in question (367) enacts in amendment that it shall be lawful for milch cows and heifers and steers under two years old to graze upon the highways upon the owners paying an annual fee of \$2 for each animal, and it provides for the appointment of inspectors to see to its enforcement. It was objected that an appeal does not lie, because the jurisdiction to quash upon summary proceedings is vested in the high court by statute, and has been in this case exercised. Section 25 of the Judicature act is limited to cases in which an action having been brought, the high court has inherent jurisdiction. The right to appeal to the court of appeal given in cases like the present by the court of appeal act of 1877 is now included in section 76 of the Judicature act, and the appeal is only to that court. Held, that an appeal lies. Rule 788 tallies precisely with the description of the court in the municipal act. Under section 378 the application to quash may be to the high court of justice, and that is afterwards explained by section 382 as being to "a judge of the high court." Held, on the merits, that by the law of Ontario it is not, as at common law, trespass of cattle are found devastating on the highway when such a use has been legalized by the municipal authorities in whom the highway is vested. Sec. 1, S. O., ch. 272, sec. 2, and R. S. O., ch. 223, sec. 546 (2). The law makes the municipality practical owner as trustee for the public, and involves a right to repair, cut down grass, etc., and sell it also, and therefore involves the right to let cattle graze, and make a charge for such grazing, thus in this respect, the bylaw unimpeachable. What may be done particularly by individual contract may be done generally by public bylaw, whereby all have equal rights of access to the pasture on reasonable terms. DURING THE PERIOD OF STATE MOURNING

No Receptions Will Be Held at Government House, Ottawa—"State Services."

(Special to The Advertiser per C. P. R.)

Ottawa, Ont., Jan. 30.—A cable has been received from the secretary of state for the colonies, stating that court mourning for her late majesty, Queen Victoria, lasts until Jan. 24, 1902. The public will wear deep mourning until March 6 next and half mourning until April 17. In consequence of this intelligence there will be no reception at the Government House until after Jan. 24, 1902.

An extra of the Canadian Gazette will be issued this afternoon, containing the above information, and the governor-general invites all persons to join in general mourning.

"STATE" SERVICES.

Lord Minto is anxious that all the ministers of the crown should attend state service in the cathedral, Christ Church, which is being organized as a state service. He would like to see them present in their Windsor uniform. But there is no state church in Canada, and as all other denominations are arranging memorial services on the same day, it is likely that the ministers will go to the churches to which they belong.

The governor-general is a member of the English Church, but in the cabinet there are Methodists, Presbyterians, Baptists and Roman Catholics.
