Great Cataract May Supply Power For Local Factories.

Pacific Coast Experiments Demonstrate the Practicability of Transmitting Power Over Long Distances.

The possibility of turning the wheels of London's factories by means of power generated at Niagara Falls has in all probability never been considered by local manufacturers; yet it is not only possible but probable that at no distant date half the manufacturers of See western Ontario will be looking toward the great cataract for their motive Our power. Until a very recent date electricians had deemed it impossible to convey electric power for commercial purposes beyond a very short distance owing to waste. But as has frequently happened before in the world of electrical research, a seeming impossibility has been accomplished. On Sunday last the street cars of Oakland, California were operated by an electric current generated on the Yuba River at a point 140 miles distant from the city. This is said to be the most satisfactory result ever achieved in the transmission of ele tric power. The power is generated by turbine wheels, the cable being of copper, six-tenths of an inch in diameter, with aluminum alloy which will prevent oxidization. It is sus-pended across Carquenez Straits by a span of 4,400 feet, and 300 feet in air. During the test of Saturday last a current of 40,000 volts was transmitted the entire distance, with a loss not exceeding five per cent.

London is about 120 miles from Niagara Falls, and it should be a comparatively easy matter to convey suffi-cient power to this city to operate every factory in it. When it sidered that, not excluding the railways, fully 200,000 tons of bituminous coal, costing \$700,000, is consumed in London every year for commercial purposes, one may form an idea of the vast saving that would be effected by the utilization of the marvelous mo tive power which is constantly going to waste at Niagara.
