The News Summary

Winnipeg is agitating for Sunday street cars.
Col. Peebles, former police magistrate of Winnipeg, is dead.
Fine ice, 16 inches thick, is being harvested on the bay at Hamilton.
It is thought that the Winnipeg Legislature will dispatch all the work before it by Friday, Feb. 21, and then prorogue.
A scuffling pierced Mr. E. M. Book's thigh at a Hamilton icehouse, and he was taken to the hospital in a serious condition.
By a decision of the United States court of appeal about 200 soldiers sent to penitentiary by courts-martial will be liberated.
An Italian named Gasparoli was shot and killed at Sault Ste. Marie by a fellow countryman whose house he was trying to break into.
A heavy snowstorm in New York State and a blizzard in Pennsylvania have interfered with travel, and in some sections no trains are running.
Fire destroyed pier 3 of the Lehigh Valley Railroad Company in New York Monday morning. The loss, including damage to shipping, is \$250,000.
The Ontario Government has appointed Charles Wonnacott, of Coburn, fishery overseer for the county of Elgin vice John Sullivan, resigned.
The following license commissioners have been appointed: North Essex, P. Corbett, F. St. Louis, A. Dufour; North Bruce, John Irwin, Neil McDougall, A. McRae.
The Broom Manufacturers' Association of the United States and Canada has decided on a general advance of brooms.
Andrew Carnegie has given \$100,000 to the Stevens Institute of Technology at Hoboken. The money is intended as an endowment for the Carnegie laboratory of engineering.
The Canadian Northern will put in effect this week a revised freight tariff providing for further reductions of 7 1/2 per cent on general merchandise between all stations on its lines.
The suspension of the City Savings Bank of Detroit has resulted in the temporary closing of operations at two prominent Utah mines, the Ophir, at Statlin, and the Tiewaukee, of Bingham.
Rev. James Livingston, of the Windsor Avenue Methodist Church, Windsor, has received an offer of \$3,000 per annum and free parsonage from the Methodist Church in Dawson City. He is considering the offer.
The mayor of Fort William is in Toronto with the object of obtaining permission from the legislature to expropriate a part of the Kakabeka Falls for the generation of electrical energy for heating and lighting purposes.
Major James R. Heakes, formerly quartermaster in the Queen's Own Rifles, has received the long service

medal, a beautiful decoration authorized by her late majesty shortly before her death. The medal is the first to be received in Toronto.

A freight train on the Seattle-Sumas branch of the Northern Pacific ran into a huge landslide at Lake Station, fifteen miles north of Seattle. Charles Fetz, the fireman, was caught between the boiler of the engine and one of the box cars, and was burned to death.
The boiler of a freight locomotive on the Lake Erie and Western Railroad exploded while the engine was standing on a siding near St. Marys, killing fireman Floyd Brown, of Lima. Engineer Edward Casey, of Fremont, was fatally scalded, and a number of cars were wrecked.

The remains of Mr. Justice Lister will be taken to Sarina for burial on the train leaving Toronto on Wednesday morning at 7:35, and the funeral services will be held at 3 o'clock in St. George's Church there.
A deputation from the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada will wait upon Premier Ross Thursday evening to express approval of Mr. Preston's bill on the subject of the settlement of strikes and labor disputes, and to ask for some amendments to the factories and labor acts.
Clad in rich red robes the skeletons of St. Magnus and St. Bonosa, two Catholic saints, who were slain at the command of a Roman emperor nearly 1,600 years ago, were buried in St. Martin's Church in Louisville, Ky., Sunday. The bones were found in the catacombs of Rome in 1700 and were given to Right Rev. Mgr. Francois Zabler, pastor of St. Martin's Church, last summer.

The coroner's jury which has been investigating the recent explosion of dynamite in the excavation for the New York Central rapid transit tunnel returned a verdict holding Ira A. Shafer, sub-contractor, Ernest J. Matheson, chief engineer of the works, and Moses Egge, who had charge of the powder house, as jointly responsible for the deaths caused by the explosion.

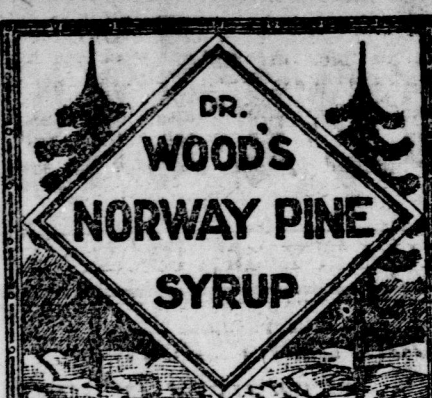

CANADIAN PACIFIC RAILWAY CAPITAL

To Be Increased Nearly \$20,000,000 for Purchase of Rolling Stock and Other Improvements.

Montreal, Feb. 11.—At a meeting of directors of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company yesterday, the usual dividend of 2 per cent on the preference stock for the half-year ended December last was declared, and a dividend of 2 1/2 per cent for the same period was declared on the common stock.
The following circular was issued by Sir Thomas G. Shaughnessy, president of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company, to the shareholders, after the board meeting today:
"To the Shareholders: The extraordinary expansion of the company's business during the past six or seven years and the apparent certainty that the volume will continue to increase year by year, renders it essential that the company should, with the least possible delay, provide such additional rolling stock and other facilities as may be required for the prompt and efficient handling of its traffic. The gradients and alignment on the busy sections of this belt have been substantially improved, so that the large and increasing tonnage may be moved with the economy requisite for the best results.
"In view of the present and prospective net earnings of the company, the directors feel justified in proposing that the money required for these purposes be secured by an issue of ordinary capital shares, rather than by other means, and therefore they recommend that the ordinary shares capital be increased by the amount of \$19,500,000.
"The directors consider that it is due to the shareholders that they should be given the privilege of subscribing for the new stock at par in the proportion of 20 per cent of their respective holdings of the outstanding common shares on the closing of the books in London, Tuesday, Feb. 13, and in New York and Montreal, Monday, March 3, 1902, and a resolution to that effect will be submitted to the shareholders for their approval.
"It is intended that the money thus raised shall be expended for the following purposes: Locomotives, cars, and other equipment; improvement of alignment and second track where required; \$6,500,000; additional grain elevators, terminals, business and passing sidings and other facilities, such as are being now provided from month to month to meet the requirements of the company's business, \$10,000,000.
"These estimates overrun the amount of the contemplated issue of stock at par, and, therefore, to make up the balance, and in order that the company's property may be benefited as fully as possible, the shares had been sold at a premium on the open market, it is proposed that the amount of about 15 per cent of the issue, or \$3,000,000, be appropriated from the surplus earnings fund, to be expended for the purposes above mentioned, in addition to the proceeds of the sale of capital stock. After appropriating this amount and providing for payment of the dividends declared on the preferred and common shares, there will still be \$8,500,000 in the surplus earnings fund.
"The subscription price of the new stock will be payable at the Bank of Montreal, London, New York and New Orleans, as follows: Twenty per cent or \$20 per share on June 27, 1902; 20 per cent, or \$20 per share, Aug. 27, 1902; 20 per cent, or \$20 per share, Oct. 27, 1902; 20 per cent, or \$20 per share, Dec. 27, 1902. No interest or dividend will be allowed on the payments made previous to July 1, or on advance payments, but all shares fully paid as above stipulated will take rank for dividend with existing shares for the half-year ending Dec. 31, 1902. No fractional shares will be issued, but rights may be assigned, and for this purpose a blank form will be provided. Holders having rights for fractions of shares should make such adjustment of their holdings, by purchase or sale, with other shareholders direct or through brokers as will make whole shares."
VICE-PRESIDENT UNDER ARREST.

Andrews, Whose Speculations Wrecked the Detroit City Savings Bank, Arrested and Released on \$10,000 Bail.

Detroit, Feb. 11.—Shortly before 9 o'clock last evening Frank Andrews, vice-president of the Detroit City Savings Bank, in the custody of Detectives Lombard and Fenton, appeared before Police Justice John B. Newman and was committed to jail on the charge of violating the banking law, made against him by County Auditor T. Hawley, Christian. This was for Friday, Feb. 21, and a few minutes later the prisoner was released on \$10,000 bail. The bank failed for \$15,000. Frank Andrews, the vice-president, overdraw his account \$9,000.

MERRY THROG AT UNIVERSITY.

Mr. George Fox, violinist, is worthy of special mention. His selections, upon appreciative ears, each number he played was heartily enjoyed. Miss Sutherland as an electonist is perfectly natural in her manner and free from the affectations which so frequently mars the efforts of an otherwise promising artist. She excels particularly in her Scotch selections.
These programmes were presented to two separate audiences. Miss Dorothy Taylor, whose name was on the programme, was unable to carry out her part of the concert. This was a disappointment to the audience, who had looked forward to hearing Miss Taylor. However, through the kindness of Mrs. Stock and Master Carson, her place was ably taken.
While musicians and electonists were entertaining the guests in the concert room, the mystery of science was being elucidated in other rooms of the building. Under the supervision of Rev. Dr. Bethune, Prof. Bowman, Dr. C. E. Macdonald, Mr. W. B. Binnie and Edgar Brown, different subjects were presented under the lens of the microscope. Principal Macdonald of the Normal School, and Dr. Hugh A. Stevenson, illustrated wireless telegraphy and Roentgen rays. The scientific part of the programme was most interesting and instructive. The microscopic examination of a drop of water, and of blood coursing through the arteries and veins, was a matter of deep interest; while, on the other hand, the presentation of Roentgen ray and wireless telegraphy apparatus, brought before the eyes of the audience the most recent scientific inventions under the observation of those whose good fortune it was to be present. In a large room, near the entrance, was located a gramophone, which, under the management of Mr. W. Horton, gave forth some familiar airs.
The programme of the promenade concert was under the direction of Mr. Anthony Cortese.
After the first and second concert lunch was served in a large room at the rear of the college.

MORE SMALLPOX

The Disease Continues to Spread—New Cases Reported in Canada.

Toronto, Feb. 10.—A number of new cases of smallpox were reported to the provincial medical health officer this morning. Six new cases have occurred in Chatham township. According to the Manitowling, Manitoulin Island, authorities, fourteen cases have occurred there. Twelve cases have been found in Ekfild township, Middlesex, but none lately.

A serious outbreak of scarlet fever is reported from Port Carling, Muskoka. In one family six are down with the disease.
Sarnia, Ont., Feb. 10.—The Observer says Dr. Bryans, a smallpox expert, arrived here at noon today. He reports that at the present time there are no less than five cases of smallpox of a modified form now in existence here—three in the house adjoining the Hotel Arlington and two children in the hotel proper. It was decided to send a message to the house in Corunna, where the disease exists, not to come here. The mayor and Ald. Cook were empowered to secure a lot and have a pest house erected, if considered necessary.

Pittsburg, Feb. 11.—Because of the discovery of two cases of smallpox the family of William Reilly, at 806 Bluff street, eighteen students of Holy Ghost College, who were keeping bachelor apartments in the building, were vaccinated and quarantined. The remaining 200 students of the institute will be vaccinated.
