MERCHANTS MEET IN CONFERENCE

Board of Trade Delegates in
Session at Toronto

THE PREFERENTIAL TARIFF

And Other Important Topics Taken
Up—"Preference for Prefer-
ence" Favored.

Toronto, June 5.—Delegates from
every important board of trade and
chamber of commerce in Canada were
present yesterday morning at the open-
ing session of the conference of the
commercial interests of the Dominion.
Mr. A. E. Ames, of the Toronto
Board of Trade, in calling the confer-
ence to order, said it was a natural
preliminary discussion to that which
would be held this summer in London
between statesmen from all colonies
in regard to imperial trade relations.
Canada had no reason to complain of
her place in the empire. No element
of greatness was lacking. The present
conference was not intended to usurp
the functions of parliament, but to ex-
press the views of business men on
questions of trade and commerce, and
matters relating to the national wel-
fare.

On the motion of Mr. Alex. McFee,
of Montreal, Mr. Ames was appointed
permanent chairman, and a resolution
was passed expressing unbounded sat-
isfaction at the return of peace, and
the hope that it would abide during
the King's reign. One member rose
and sang "God Save the King," after
which the notice on the order paper
was taken up.

Capt. John Gaskin, of the Kingston
Board of Trade, moved that the rate
of postage on newspapers and peri-
odicals between Canada and the mo-
therland be reduced to the same figure
as the domestic rate. This was agreed
to without debate.

PREFERENTIAL TARIFF.

The debate of the day was precipi-
tated on a resolution passed on be-
half of the Montreal Board of Trade
by George E. Drummond, to the effect
that the conference was of the opinion
that Great Britain should not be in-
terested in the empire by giving the
products of the colonies a preference
in her markets against the products
of foreign countries. If England be-
lieved that such preference would stimulate
trade and develop colonial enterprises,
and moreover, serve to make the col-
onies actively interested in the empire,
a number of British subjects emigrating
annually from the British Isles, but
also to the surplus population of other
countries, and the colonies, and the
benefit Great Britain by largely freeing
her from dependence upon foreign coun-
tries for her food supplies.

Mr. Drummond moved that as long as
Great Britain would see that the best
way of teaching the virtues of free
trade would be to give other nations a
dose of their own medicine. If Eng-
land gave her colonies a preference of
goods in fifteen years she would be
independent of foreign supplies.

The first amendment to the motion
was adopted unanimously. It provided
that Sir Wilfrid Laurier be urged to
advocate in his speech at the Imperial
conference to consider the best means
to bring about a preference.

Mr. George McLagan, of Stratford
Board of Trade, moved that the im-
perial tariff be reduced to the same
figure as the domestic rate. This was
agreed to without debate.

Mr. Robert Munro, of Montreal, stated
the original resolution said nothing
about making a bargain.

Mr. John Russell, of Winnipeg, said
his own province could, from its 45-
000,000 acres of wheat land, provide all
the wheat required by Great Britain. The
only thing that was needed was peo-
ple.

Mr. W. J. Ferguson, of Stratford,
said the Montreal Board of Trade
resolution meant a bargain.

Mr. C. A. Young, of Winnipeg, said that
by 1905, the Canadian West would fur-
nish as much wheat as is now sent by
the United States and Canada to Great
Britain.

Mr. B. Dumoulin, Quebec, held that
care should be taken to see that the
proposed arrangement was a better
closer trade relations with the United
States would be. He rather favored
turning to them for better relations.
Retaliation for a preference policy
would injure Canada.

Mr. D. R. Wilkie, of the Imperial
Bank, said there was no fear of fur-
ther retaliation on the part of the
United States. They had done their
worst to Canada, and what he feared
was that the next endeavor would be
to bribe us by free trade or reciprocity
to abandon the British preference. He
hoped that bribe would be resisted
should it come.

Mr. F. X. Perrault, Gaspé, Que., and
D. Masson, Montreal, favored the re-
solution, speaking for French-Can-
adian businessmen, the latter saying

Mr. Jacques Bureau, M.P. Three
Rivers, thought the Montreal resolu-
tion too broad, and Mr. Sanford Evans
Winnipeg, feared that the wording
might prejudice the case in the En-
glish mind. He moved to refer it to
a committee for amendment.

This was lost, as was Stratford's
amendment, and the Montreal resolu-
tion of preference for preference was
adopted.

A resolution of the Winnipeg grain
exchange was also indorsed asking for
a specific preference of colonial grain
in Great Britain.

GIRL GETS INTO TROUBLE

Conversing Over the Telephone
With a Married Man.

Wife "Caught On" and the Lassie
Got 60 Days in Jail.

Port Chester, N. Y., June 5.—Police
Justice Marshall sentenced Alice Myers,
a young woman of this place, to 60
days in the county jail for attempting
to alienate the affections of W. S. Wet-
more, a builder, of Port Chester, from
his wife by telephoning.

Months ago, she looked up his tele-
phone number and often rang up his
house and asked him to meet her, it
is said. Usually the telephone was
answered by Mrs. Wetmore, who ex-
hausted every effort to stop her hus-
band's admirer's name.

When Mrs. Wetmore answered the
phone Miss Myers told her that she
was not wanted. She said she wanted
to talk to Mr. Wetmore.

Mrs. Wetmore testified that one
morning when the bell rang she stood
close to the phone and heard Miss
Myers say to her husband:

"Don't be afraid, Will. What do you
care for her? She can't do anything."
After she heard this Mrs. Wetmore
ripped up the telephone and swore out
a warrant for Miss Myers' arrest. A
dozen or more of Mrs. Wetmore's wo-
men friends attended the trial and
cheered Justice Marshall when he sen-
tenced Miss Myers to jail.

Miss Myers was represented by for-
mer Assistant District Attorney David
Verplanck. After she was taken to the
county jail in White Plains he ap-
peared before County Judge Platt and
secured her release on a writ of habeas
corpus. Mr. Verplanck contended that
the charge against Miss Myers of tele-
phoning to Wetmore did not consti-
tute a criminal offense and that the
Port Chester justice had no right to
send Miss Myers to jail.
