DISMISSAL OF HIGH CONSTABLE MOVED AT THE COUNTY COUNCIL

No Other Alternative, Declared a Member of Special Committee.

The county constabulary investigation received another airing at yesterday afternoon's sitting of the county council, when Councillors Lewis and Cousins moved that High Constable McLeod be dismissed. It was moved in amendment by Councillors Hutchinson and Clark, that the high constable's services be retained until the January session.

Councillor Lewis, in speaking to his motion, declared that in view of the committee's report, which had been adopted without discussion, there was no other alternative but to introduce a motion to dismiss Mr. McLeod. He was doing his duty by the council and for the committee. They had given Mr. McLeod plenty of time to resign, but he had not done so. More than that, they had done their whole duty in asking Judge Macbeth to dismiss the other county constables.

Councillor Hutchinson proposed the motion, and declared that when the council received the report it did not necessarily mean the dismissal of McLeod. They would receive the report for what it was. There was nothing to show they were swallowing their own words if they refused to dismiss McLeod. Mr. McDonald did not think it right from the report to dismiss McLeod. The trouble was that the four constables reported did not work in unison with the high constable. The work could not be done with them acting as they did. He would vote for the amendment, and give McLeod another chance, and then, if he did not do his duty, he would have him dismissed.

Should Stand by Committee.

Councillor McCallum advised the council to stand by the committee. There was no use in paying them on the back and saying that the report was good, and all that, and then going directly against the committee's findings. What was the use of committees if that were done? What would be the use of that expenditure? There should be something done to prevent lobbying.

Councillor Westman would stand by the committee. Whether the others were discharged or not, the council had gone as far as possible, and had advised the dismissal of the officers.

They had done their duty, and they should stand by the committee. The whole outfit should be removed. Will Vote for Dismissal.

Councillors Hutchinson and Clark, in speaking to the amendment, stated that their only object in putting McLeod's dismissal to the January session was merely in the interests of the county. They would both vote for his dismissal then. They would not elect a man for the position at present, and by then there would be plenty of applicants.

Councillor Turnbull gave his reasons for desiring the dismissal of McLeod. He said that it was common talk that disorderly houses existed east of the city. McLeod acknowledged that he knew of their existence in June. When asked why he did not raid them, he said he would do so right away. Two weeks later he met McLeod, and the latter excused himself for not raiding the houses because of the strike at the G. T. R. roundhouse, and he was too busy. Why did he not attend to the county's business and let the city look after its own? If he (the speaker) hired a man, and let him do what he was told to do, he would discharge him. McLeod had admitted to the committee that he had done wrong in this matter.

Higher Salaries Advocated.

Councillor Lewis, in answering the objection that insubordination of the other officers was the cause of the difficulty, said that all McLeod had to do was to get the county constables in working order, and they would have been dismissed. He had done it with another. Why could he not do it with these men?

Councillor Young advocated higher salaries, and that they would be better men in the positions.

Councillor Cousins, in answering the charge that it was to the interests of the county to retain McLeod until January, said that if he could be shown that the county constables were doing off without McLeod then it was at present, he would withdraw all objections to the amendment.

During the discussion it developed that McLeod had received \$407 in 1903 and \$570 in 1904 from the county, besides fees.

Both the motion and amendment were withdrawn, the matter to be further discussed today. The disposition of the county constables was what was done with the four constables.

Mr. J. D. McColl was recommended by the council as a county constable.
