The portals at each end will be of concrete and the tunnel will be drained by a four-inch tile drain. The contract calls for the tunnel being completed

AGO RECALLED

Old-Timers to Interview Their Diaries.

The extreme mildness of the weather has prompted some of our readers to recall the winters of long ago, says the Toronto News. One gentleman has been looking up his diary and sends a record of the mild winter of 1887-8. Another pioneer is moved to recall severe weather of by-gone days, and by consulting his diary finds that the winter of 1867-8 was the severest in the last 40 years. Both letters are given below.

Sleighs Not Used All Winter. Subscriber West Gwillembury, says: It is not necessary to go further back than the winter of 1877 and 1878 to find a parallel to the present mild winter. I give a few extracts from a

diary of that date: December - Plowing practicable throughout the month.

January-Light frosts and snow-Feb. 13-Beautiful mild weather. Feb. 22-Rain all day.

Feb. 27-Very warm; the month throughout very mild and pleasant. March-First week mud very deep on roads. March 8-9-Very warm, sun rising
