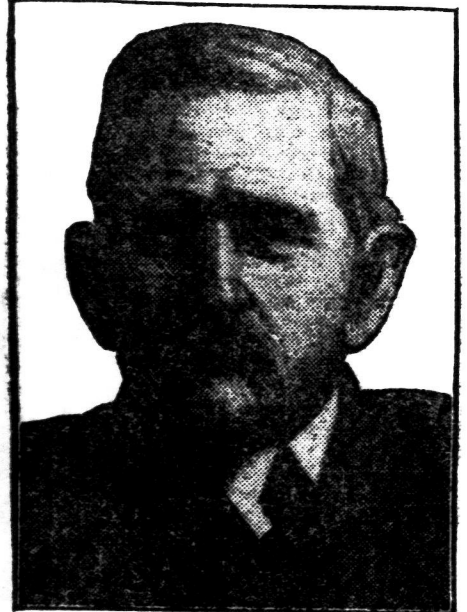

A MEMORIAL TO KING GEORGE V.

Church of England in Diocese of Huron Address the Sovereign.

READ BY THE BISHOP

Catechism Is Not Taught in Many Sunday Schools, Said Dean Davis—Missionary Work.

An impressive feature of the session of the Synod of Huron yesterday afternoon was the reading of the following memorial to the King by Bishop Williams, while all present stood up:

To His Most Excellent Majesty, the King:
Most Gracious Sovereign,
We, the bishop and lay representatives of the Church of England in the Diocese of Huron, in synod assembled at London, Canada, humbly desire to express on this, our first meeting since your majesty's accession, our most devoted loyalty to your majesty's crown and person;

We would also convey to your majesty and to our gracious Queen Mary, and to Alexandra, the queen mother, and the members of the royal family, our deepest sympathy in the loss sustained through the death of our late beloved King, your royal and august father.

Your majesty's intimate knowledge of the affairs of this vast empire and the evident interest which you have taken in your overseas dominions, inspire in us a great confidence that the happy conclusion of the empire so largely brought about by the wise, far-seeing and balanced judgment of your illustrious father, will be maintained by you, and that the influence of the crown and empire of Great Britain will increase more and more for the uplifting of humanity, and the reign of peace upon earth.

We wish your majesty a long, happy and prosperous reign, and our prayers will ever ascend to the King of Kings and Lord of Lords that your majesty may be strengthened and guided in the government of this great empire over which, by the providence of God, you have been called to rule.

The report on the Sunday schools presented by Canon Downie, of Port Stanley, caused a great deal of discussion, particularly a clause indicating that the returns showed that catechism is not taught in many Sunday schools.

Dean Davis made an address in which he said that he regretted very greatly this state of affairs, and Mr. John Ramsay asked to know the names of the churches where the catechism is not taught. Bishop Williams read a list of those schools in which it was reported the catechism was not taught, and a number of explanations followed.

"The matter is not so bad as it seemed to be," said the bishop. It will, however, be looked into by his lordship.

The evening session was entirely devoted to missionary interests, the speakers being N. F. Davidson, K.C., Evelyn MacRae and F. W. Allen, all of Toronto.

Mr. MacRae declared that missionary work is no longer a side issue, Canada's share being \$3,200,000 for the foreign work, and \$1,200,000 for the home field.

Mr. Allen spoke on "Men and Missions," and pointed out the unsparing opportunities there are today for all kinds of missionary work, especially in the Canadian West.

Mr. Allen, who is secretary of the Laymen's Missionary Movement for the Anglican Church, spoke most optimistically of the progress that is being made. The greatest problem the church has to face, he declared, is the great prizes in the west, where loneliness, hardship and discomforts of all kinds have to be endured.

GRAFTING AN EYE NEW SURGEON'S FEAT

Cornea of New York Chinaman's Optic Is Replaced With Fellow Patient's.

New York, June 9.—Through the transplanting of a section of the cornea of the human eye, an operation which was performed yesterday at the Flower Hospital, surgeons hope that sight will be restored to a Chinese merchant of this city who has been blind for years. The operation, which was witnessed by a large number of surgeons, is believed to be the only one of its kind ever performed in America. Dr. Von Hippel, an eminent German surgeon and the originator of the operation, however, has successfully transplanted a rabbit's cornea into a human eye.

Dr. Royal S. Copeland, dean of the hospital, performed the operation. When he first examined the eyes of the patient he found the cornea or transparent coat of each eyeball so opaque that the patient could not distinguish night from day. Among the other patients in the hospital was one whose left eye had been injured so badly that it was necessary to remove it. The cornea of this eye, however, was normal, and it was decided to operate on both patients at the same time and use the cornea of the discarded eye to remedy the defect in one of the eyes of the Chinese.

Both patients were anaesthetized at the same time and placed on operating tables. Dr. Copeland stood between the two tables. First, a circular section of the opaque cornea of the eye of the Chinese was removed. Four of the five layers of the cornea were cut through. The fifth was left intact so that the aqueous humor of the eye might not escape. The surgeon then turned to the other patient and removed from the normal cornea of the injured eye a section similar in size and shape to that removed from the opaque cornea. This healthy section was placed in the orifice which had been made in the eye of the Chinese and the eye was then banded and the other patient's eye was removed.

CAR TURNED TURTLE.

Dover, N. J., June 8.—While riding to the surface in a hoisting car at the Richard mine, two miles north of Dover, last night, five men were instantly killed, another was injured, and four others had a miraculous escape from death when the car turned turtle.

LONDON WILL SECURE THE NEXT CONVENTION

London Health Association Confident That Dominion Association Will Be Here in 1911.

The London Health Association confidently expect that the next convention of the Dominion Association for the Prevention of Tuberculosis will be held in London. No decision has been arrived at as yet, but word will be received shortly.

On Tuesday last Hon. Adam Beck presented the invitation from Mayor Beattie, and also that of the London Health Association, asking the Dominion Association to meet in London next year, and it was most favorably received. He also read the first annual report of the London Health Association.

Dr. Hodgetts, formerly secretary of the provincial board, but later in charge of the public health and most of the conservation commission's work reported very favorably on the work being done in London for the care of consumptives. The Alexandra Sanatorium was one of the best equipped for taking care of patients in all stages of the disease on the continent. He favored the invitation to hold the next convention in this city.

"We expect a favorable response as soon as the question is settled," said Hon. Adam Beck. "Dr. Hodgetts spoke very favorably of our work here, and expressed the hope that the convention would meet in London next year."

There were a large number of delegates from all over the Dominion of Canada present at the convention. Dr. F. Drake and Dr. W. J. Stevenson represented London at the convention.

NOTABLE EULOGY OF THE THUNDERER

Devotes Three Columns to Goldwin Smith's Life and Comments Thereon.

London, June 9.—The Pall Mall Gazette says that in Goldwin Smith we lose one of the most brilliant and most deadly wielders of the pen that modern times have seen. The keen, cold logic, witty sarcasm, bright charm of humor in word and thought which played around the sting, were the result of rapid play. Whatever cause it was that Goldwin Smith was striking—slavery, Irish Nationalism, imperial federation, or woman's suffrage—he struck home, and the brilliant neatness of the blow was admired, even by the party that it smote under the fifth rib.

Times' High Tribute.
The Times, in the course of a three-column memoir of Goldwin Smith, says he was almost a perfect master of his contemporaries as a master of English prose. He was perfectly free from party ties or bias. In Canadian politics he was the determined foe of political corruption. Standing alone in the prestige of an intimate association with great literary and political figures of a remarkable period in England, he was the dominating force in the command an attentive hearing. He set and maintained a standard of literary excellence in Canadian journalism which is everywhere recognized and appreciated. He stood for purity in civic administration, and for honor in political conduct. Unscrupulous tools of party dashed the lash of his cutting satire. Even those who differed from him most, read with interest and pleasure his brilliant periods, but in spite of the charm of his style and the strength of his intellect, he did not at once age with which he expressed them, and the general excellence of his intentions, he never gained the place of influence in Canadian life to which he probably aspired, and to which his abilities appeared to entitle him.

DR. SMITH'S LAST WISH

Told Minister Church Union Would Insure Peace of World.

London, June 9.—"In the death of Goldwin Smith, Beverly Street Baptist Church has lost a friend indeed; he will be missed by all who knew him. No more will his familiar figure be seen in our church," said Rev. W. H. Wallace, last evening.

For years he has been an adherent of the church, and up till the time of his accident last February he attended one of the services every Sunday. "The last time he was in the church was the last Sunday in January of this year, when he occupied his customary seat immediately in front of the pulpit. On that occasion Prof. P. S. Campbell, of McMaster University, was the preacher, and knowing Dr. Smith was hard hearing, the professor delivered his sermon standing on the floor near the grand old man.

"Many of the ideas held by some people concerning Dr. Smith's views on religion were incorrect. He was a man of great knowledge and wisdom."

"He may have held different opinions about religion from the majority of people, but that does not say he was an agnostic."

"Goldwin Smith took a keen interest in the church. When he could not get over on Sunday he would send a synopsis of the services to the church, and to our church, especially to the poor. Two winters ago, when so many poor families suffered, he gave me a check for a large amount to be given to those who needed help in my congregation."

"You can put him down as a practical Christian; he was not a dogmatic Christian."

"He was always a most reverent worshipper and entered into the spirit of the service when he attended the church."

Mr. Wallace described his visit to the great scholar a few days ago—the last time he saw him alive. "He was then very feeble, so feeble he could hardly speak," said Mr. Wallace, and he spoke about church union and said he was in entire accordance with it for the sake of the peace of the world, which the union, he estimated would bring about.

"Yes, there's a seat vacant in our church," said the pastor in conclusion.

WILL IT BE CONNAUGHT?

Once Again Mentioned as Successor to Earl Grey.

London, June 9.—With the reassembling of Parliament there was a revival of the rumor that the Duke of Connaught, brother of the late King Edward VII., will succeed Earl Grey as governor-general in Canada. It is stated that the duke is eager to obtain the appointment. He regards his military career as at an end, and would like to fill an administrative position in Canada.

It is well known that the late King was anxious that his brother should accept the post. The monarch's death, however, has created a problem in some minds whether his place in England would not be desirable, in the event of King George's death before the Prince of Wales reached his majority. In such event he would probably be made regent.

REVOLT IN YUCATAN

Banished Mexican Officers Said To Be Leading Insurgents.

El Paso, Texas, June 9.—The gunboat Morelos, with two battalions of infantry, reached Progreso, the principal seaport of Yucatan, today, from Vera Cruz, and the troops were at once dispatched inland. The troops have been on duty in the State of Vera Cruz, and the Mexican Government has confidence that they will be able to deal with the trouble of the insurgents. They were taken inland through Merida, the capital, where they were loudly cheered, showing that the people of the capital are loyal. They cannot reach the section of dissatisfaction without a hard march, and this may be delayed from the fact that Col. Victor Montenegro, leader of the rebels, has seized the army transportation and also torn up the railroad tracks.

The fact that Col. Montenegro is one of the rebel leaders gives a new aspect to the revolt. He was one of the officers who was banished from a house birth in Mexico to Yucatan for exhibiting a preference for Gen. Bernardo Reyes for vice-president against the wish of President Diaz, and it is said that a number of other officers banished have taken up arms with the insurgents.

A RECORD IN PERIL

C. P. R. Flyer May Take Slice Off the Western Passage.

Quebec, Que., June 9.—The C. P. R. Express of Ireland, coming from Liverpool, with passengers, mails and general cargo, will most likely take a considerable slice off the western record between Liverpool and Quebec, unless she is detained by fog or some other unforeseen occurrence.

The Express of Ireland left Liverpool at 5:30 o'clock on Friday afternoon, June 12, and was 185 miles east of Belle Isle at 12:40 p.m. yesterday, and is due in port at 4 o'clock tomorrow afternoon, after allowing for a delay in land tunnel through Ottawa, passed at Rimouski. If she covers the distance in the time expected she will make the run from Liverpool to Quebec in 6 days, 3 hours and 30 minutes.

C. P. R. AT CAPITAL.

Ottawa, June 9.—"Time was when a dollar looked as big as a cartwheel to the C. P. R., but it does not look so big now," said Mr. D. Nicolson, president of the company, in addressing the board of control here, and in telling them the full details of the company's plan to build a million-dollar tunnel through Ottawa, connect the Union and Central stations, and thus get a better train service and look ahead for a good many years.
