Prepare for Winter Nights

To the Editor of This Advertiser:
My attention has been called to an article on the front page of the Toronto World, which I take to be a reply to the letter I sent you some time ago, and now, let me send you mine. The first paragraph of this article, as follows: "The difference between cattle, corn fed, and pasture fed on pasture, is the difference between the truth as told by the aged expert (meaning Mr. G. H. Brown) and the whole truth as told by two of the largest dealers in the Toronto market." Now, the world admits the difference between cattle corn fed and those fed on pasture is the difference between the truth as told by the aged expert, except the one difference which he disputes—that is, the difference between the American cattle, he states, corn fed, and the Canadian cattle, which he states are grass fed.

Now, export cattle selling in Toronto at 6c to 6 1/4c, cannot be classed as purely grass cattle, for they have, as a general thing, been fed some kind of grain during winter, and many of them are fat enough to be classed fair exporters before they went on to the grass, and therefore, are as good as American cattle fed in the same way, with the exception of being corn fed while on the grass; but both cattle sell at approximately the same price.

kets, which you can prove by referring to the cable reports of John Rogers & Sons, Liverpool, who are the largest salesmen on the British market, and sell American as well as Canadian cattle, in which they report last Saturday that best Canadian cattle were selling, dressed weight, at 13c, and best American cattle were selling at 12 1/4c—a difference of 1/4c on dressed meat, which is equal to 1/2c on cattle, live weight. Now, you will find proof of this in Rogers' cable report to the Toronto News of the 26th inst., also to the Daily Globe of the 26th inst.

Now, let me further draw your attention to the market reports of Monday, the 18th Inst., wherein Swift & Co are reported purchasing 122 Canadian cattle for shipment to London. Now, the London market calls for the best quality of cattle crossing the ocean, and we believe that the Swift Co. considered these cattle good enough in quality to send them to their best customers, who buy the best cattle which cross the ocean.

Now, let me gently whisper in the ears of the editor of the Toronto World and
