TURKEY DECLARES WAR ON BULGARIA AND SERVIA

TURKEY'S DECLARATION.

Constantinople, Oct. 17 .- A note addressed by the Turkish Government this morning to the Bulgarian and Servian legations here, said it was impossible to maintain peace any longer notwithstanding that it was the ardent desire of the Porte to do so. It was therefore obliged to put an end to the Typhoid Epidemic at Insane ceptionally brilliant course at the missions of the Bulgarian and Servian legations, and the diplomats were invited to withdraw their passports and leave Constantinople at the earliest

> The note states that the step was taken in consequence of the recent note handed in to the Turkish Government by the Balkan states, which Turkey considered constituted an interference with her internal affairs. A second factor was the medilization undertaken by Servia and Bulgaria, and the third reason was the daily skirmishes on the frontier.

> Constantinople, Oct. 17.—The formal declaration of wa. against Servia and Bulgaria was published by the Turkish Government today.
