Ontario Club Is Not Headquarters for Liberalism—Conservatives Members.

An Absolute Falsehood.

"Permit me to say that the statement is entirely without foundation. The Ontario Club is not the official headquarters of the Liberal party in this Province. It is a social club, organized in the same way as the Albany, the National or the Toronto clubs. Its membership is composed of both Liberals and Conservatives. In the second place, I am neither an officer nor a director of the club, and have no more to say in its management than any other of its more than 500 members; and on the other hand, the Ontario Club, as such, has no say or voice in shaping the policy of the Liberal party. I believe it is an exceedingly high-class and well-run club, but like all the other leading clubs in Toronto, it has a club license.

Would Abolish All Licenses.

"The honorable member for West Hastings asked the other day if I have been doing anything to get this license cancelled. Permit me to say that I have been doing my best, not only to secure the abolition of this license, but the licenses of every other club in this Province. My regret is that I have not received any support in so doing from the honorable member for West Hastings, or any other member on the Government side of the House."

From opinions freely expressed it looks as though the association will almost unanimously demand Evanturel's retirement. Some of his friends have started the race-religion cry in his favor, declaring he is being persecuted by Messrs. Pyne, Ferguson and Hanna and the Orangemen of Ontario. This was freely discussed in various parishes after church on Sunday.

Mr. Evanturel's personal friends in Alfred are outspoken in these declarations. Mr. Evanturel, it is understood, will be asked to attend the meeting on Saturday.

GAMEY WOULD HAVE
AN IRON BOUNTY

Introduces Resolution to That Effect in Legislature.

Toronto, March 2.—To assist the iron and steel industry R. R. Gamey (Montreal) has filed notice of a resolution in the Provincial Legislature that in "The opinion of this House, the development of Canada would be stimulated and public interest promoted by the granting of such a measure of assistance by the Parliament of Canada as would place the iron and steel industry of this country on an assured and permanent footing."

A similar resolution is now before the House of Commons and Mr. Gamey is endeavoring to secure the Legislature's endorsement to the motion at Ottawa which seeks to have a bounty of 50 cents a ton paid on all pig iron smelted in Canada from Canadian ores.

Hanna Admits License Inspector Visited Peel, Huron and Welland.

Toronto, March 2.—The House sat for barely half an hour. The paper was cleared of a number of encumbering questions today to make ready for the budget on Thursday.

Hon. J. J. Poy stated that the total expenditure to date in connection with the workmen's compensation commission exclusive of printing was \$8,702.17. The amount is made up as follows: 1911, \$1,574.49; 1912, \$3,964.68; 1913, \$3,163.

Hon. W. J. Hanna admitted that Provincial License Inspector W. K. Snider had been in the three counties that stood on the Canada temperance act on Jan. 29 last. Mr. Snider was in Peel County at Brampton, on Jan. 20; he was in Huron County at Wingham on Jan. 23; at Clinton, on the 24th, and at Goderich on the 25th; in Welland County, at Ridgeway, on the 26th; at Stevensville, on the 27th. He said he would explain the whole matter when the estimates were being debated.

Hon. W. T. Hearst stated that construction had been commenced on the Lake Huron and Northern Ontario Railway. No official report has been made to department.

Lieut.-Col. T. R. Mayberry (South Oxford) introduced a bill to amend the assessment act to again press on the Government the desirability of permitting municipalities to have a differential assessment on land improvements.

Another bill to amend the assessment act was brought in by Mr. J. G. Anderson (South Bruce) to enable township councils by bylaw to have tax notices sent through the mails, instead of having to be delivered by the tax collector.

Mr. Anderson would also keep motor vehicles off the highways during certain hours.

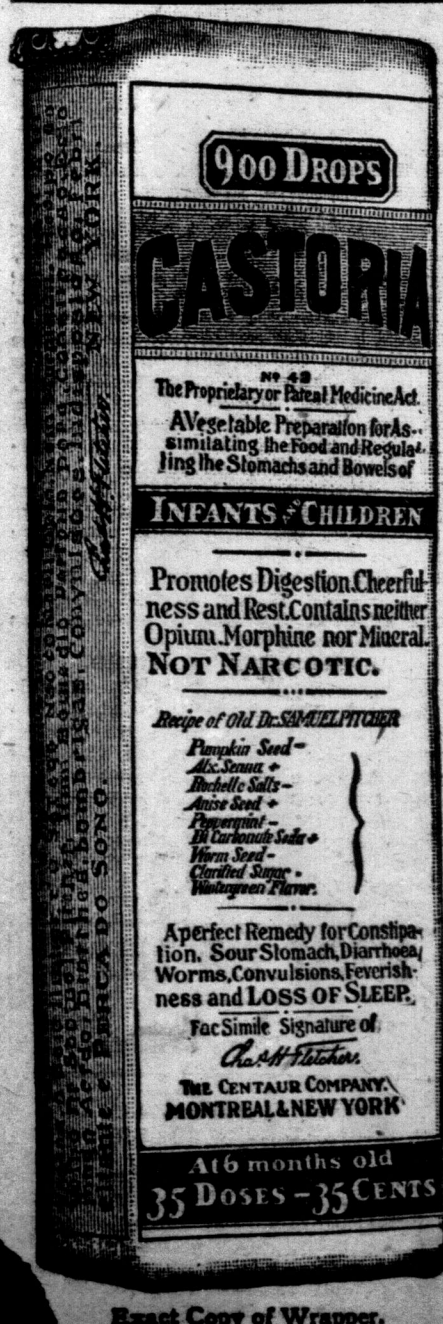
The shapes are small and snug fitting, and black will again be very strong. First colors are persian blue, soft green, mahogany and brown tones.
