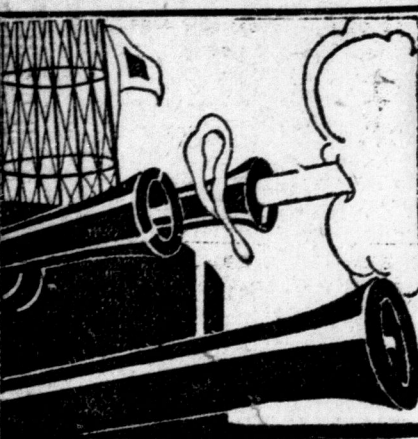

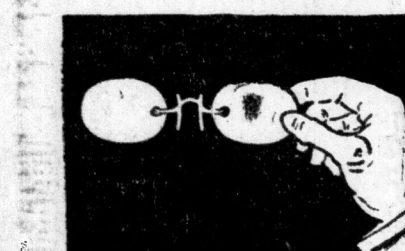

M. M.—Can a medical health officer go through a district and quarantine one or two families for measles when they have become an epidemic and the others are left to go in and out as they wish?

Ans.—Yes. He can use his own judgment in the matter.
Does the quarantine compel those of the family who have had measles before to come under the quarantine law?

Ans.—Yes. Can a health officer be held responsible if he neglects to quarantine the families which he has not quarantined?

Who is to pay the costs of the quarantine, the township or the one quarantined?

Ans.—The township.

A Subscriber—Is a mortgage that was drawn up, for five years, interest paid yearly; at the end of five years is it out of date and has to be renewed or how long can it run if the interest is paid yearly?

Ans.—Can run for ten years from the last payment of interest.

A Landlord—A rents a house to B and B is using his house and also his own in paying up his rent sends him a letter notifying to vacate and deliver up possession of premises at the end of month. B has now left town and has not acknowledged notice at all. What proceeding can be taken to gain possession of house and collect two months back rent.

Ans.—Take proceedings under the provisions of the Landlord and Tenant's act as to overholding tenants and you had better consult a lawyer.

WESTERN FARMERS WILL TELL NEEDS TO PARTY LEADERS

Will Meet Them On Tour and Urge Free Wheat, Lowering Tariff on British Imports and Smaller Freight Rates.

[Canadian Press.]
WINNIPEG, July 28.—In connection with the visit of Sir Robert Borden and Sir Wilfrid Laurier to the West in the course of the next few weeks, arrangements have been completed by the organized farmers of Alberta, Saskatchewan and Manitoba, from which delegations will meet both the Premier and the ex-premier and present to them the needs of the West as seen by the grain growers at every point where public meetings are held. This decision was arrived at at a meeting of the Canadian Council of Agriculture, representing the grain growers' associations of all three provinces held in Winnipeg.

It is reported that Hon. W. T. White, minister of finance, will make an independent tour of the West at the same time as Premier Borden, and if this is correct, arrangements will be made to wait upon both gentlemen, as the tariff is considered by the grain growers the biggest question in the West.

Free Wheat Demanded.
The protective tariff will be condemned, and the farmers will ask that the American offer of free interchange of wheat and wheat products be accepted immediately; also that an effort be made to encourage closer trade relations with Great Britain by reducing the tariff on British imports to fifty per cent. The tariff imposed on like products from other countries.

Lower Freight Rates.
They will ask for lower freight rates on the railways, and on the great lakes, as well as an amendment to the coastwise shipping regulations on the lakes. Premier Borden will be urged to secure the Hudson's Bay Railway completed as rapidly as possible, and to have a line of steamships ready to connect it with the European markets within another two years.

Amend Bank Act.
Both leaders will be urged to support amendments to the bank act, providing that no bank doing business in Western Canada may charge on loans a rate of interest more than four per cent in excess of the interest allowed on deposits. If this amendment is made to the bank act, the farmers believe it will force the banks to raise the rate of interest they pay for deposits in Western Canada before they would be allowed to charge ten to twelve per cent on loans to farmers.

The alleged concentration of the money power in Canada and the high rate of interest charged on mortgages in Western Canada will also be discussed.

LONDON BATTERY CASE HAS BEEN CONCLUDED

MADAME CALLAUX IS FREED BY JURY

French Emotions Run Wild as She is Cheered and Jeered.

SCENE HAS ODD ENDING
Riotous Feeling is Subdued by Spectacle of Opposing Counsel Kissing.

PARIS, July 28.—Mme. Henriette Callaux was tonight acquitted by the jury in the Court of Assize of the wilful murder, on March 16 last, of Gaston Calmette, editor of the Figaro. The jury brought in its verdict after fifty minutes' deliberation, and the announcement was followed by the wildest tumult.

Mme. Callaux tottered and fell upon the neck of her counsel, Fernand Labori, and embraced him. Her hair was undone and fell on her shoulders; her hat dropped to the floor. The spectators stood upon desks and chairs, and the tumult was followed by the wildest tumult.

The spectacle of Labori and Chenu, the latter counsel for the Calmette family, embracing each other, calmed the tumult for a moment, and the jury deliberated when they left with Mme. Callaux.

Falling to make himself heard, the presiding judge, followed by the other judges, marched out of the room. The advocates took complete possession of the court; some of them mounted the judge's desk and harangued the crowd. The guards then cleared a portion of the court, and comparative quiet being re-established, Judge Albanel returned and read the judgment, ordering the release of Mme. Callaux.

Cries of "Murderess!"
Much shaken with emotion, Mme. Callaux left by the witnesses' door, the guards making a lane through the crowd. She covered her face with her hands as if to shield herself from the furious cries of "Murderess!"

By way of a number of narrow corridors and back stairs she reached a small side door in the Palace of Justice, where an automobile was waiting, and drove off unobserved.

TAMWORTH GIRL'S BODY FOUND UNDER CELLAR OF HOUSE

Revolting Crime Revealed by Discovery of Remains of Blanche Yorke—Missing Physician Suspected.

TAMWORTH, July 28.—A revolting crime has been unearthed in the discovery of the body of Miss Blanche Yorke, the dressmaker, who had been missing from her home since July 8, in the cellar of the house recently occupied by Dr. C. K. Robinson, late this afternoon.

That the girl met a violent death is practically certain, but whether it was the result of actual foul play or the sad sequence of an operation, is yet to be proved, but the position in which the body was found demonstrates that a deliberate attempt was made to dispose of the remains or hide them sufficiently to ward off suspicion until the guilty party or parties could show clear heads.

Today's ghastly discovery is the culmination of a series of searches, in pursuit of questionable clues all over the country. The girl had been in the habit of attending Dr. Robinson for treatment, and he was the last person she was known to have visited previous to her disappearance. But he blandly pushed aside any questions. Though a search of his house was made by Messrs. A. B. Carscallen, Henry Richardson and Dr. Miller, the suspicions were temporarily diverted.

The levying of a distress warrant was the initial means of the discovery. Messrs. Taylor and W. D. Richardson, and W. P. Carscallen, the bailiff, were making a seizure of furniture at the vacated Robinson home for non-payment of debts, when, proceeding to the bedroom to remove the mattresses, Mr. Taylor noticed blood stains on the bed-rail, and pulling up the blind, saw larger blood stains on the floor.

Messrs. Ed and Sam Yorkie, brothers of the deceased, were immediately informed of the suspicions and a thorough search of the whole house was made by the party. Reaching the cellar, they found the charred portions of a mattress, unburnt sections were covered with blood.

Turning over some boxes, Ed Yorkie noticed a peculiar odor, and immediately exclaimed, "I have found something." The investigators then raged, and commenced digging out the earth, and the body was found three inches below the surface. The news of the discovery soon spread, and a large crowd assembled around the house.

Crown Attorney C. H. Preston and Coroner Cowan, both residents of Naperville, were notified and left for the scene. In the meantime, Dr. Wilson, who was requested by Coroner Cowan to take charge of the remains and see that they were left intact, until he arrived.

SINCLAIR, CONSERVATIVE WINS IN S. OXFORD

On Re-count Has 5 Majority Over Mayberry—Appeal Likely.
