

ORANGEMEN WILL ASK AMENDMENT OF SCHOOL ACT

Grand Association of Saskatchewan to Fight Enlarged Privilege.

Want Recent Amendment Disallowed by Premier Borden Repealed as Illegal.

Ottawa, June 22.—It is stated here on good authority that the Grand Association of the Orange Order of Saskatchewan, backed by the Orange Order of Ontario and by the organ of the order, the Orange Sentinel, will take steps to have the 1913 amendment of the Saskatchewan school act disallowed by Premier Borden on the ground of unconstitutionality. The Grand Association of Saskatchewan is at present endeavoring to raise funds to test the amendment in the courts, and to carry the same to the judicial committee of the privy council in England. They desire that the recent amendment be repealed.

May Be Illegal.
A strong body of opinion in the Orange Order, however, is to the effect that if the amendment is unconstitutional, it is more expeditious and less costly method than by recourse to the courts would be to convince the Borden Government of the unconstitutionality of the amendment and have it disallowed by federal authority. Such a disallowance could take place within one year after a copy of the amended act has been received by the Secretary of State.

The contention is that the new amendment enlarges the separate school privilege and compels the support of two schools by residents in districts where separate and public schools exist. As a matter of fact a few ratepayers, Protestant or Roman Catholic, may petition for the establishment of a separate school, but the said school is otherwise in every respect under the general school act. Text books, inspection, etc., are all under the general school law, which applies to public as well as to separate schools.

Former Situation.
Previous to the passing of the Saskatchewan act of 1905, the school laws of the Northwest Territories had been consolidated by chapter 21 of the laws of 1901, sections 41 to 45 inclusive of the laws of 1901, and for the procedure for the establishment of Protestant or Roman Catholic separate schools, and by the act of Parliament of Canada, 1905, establishing Saskatchewan into a province. The principal of these sections of the school laws were embodied into the constitution granted to the said province of Saskatchewan. By chapter 100 of the revised statutes of Saskatchewan, passed in 1909, four years after the province was established, sections 41 to 45 inclusive, are the same as sections 41 to 45 inclusive in the laws of 1901; subsection 2 of section 45 of chapter 100 of the revised statutes of Saskatchewan, 1909 is as follows: "(2) any person who is legally assessed or assessable for a public school shall not be liable to assessment for any separate school established therein."

Was Amended.
At the recent session of the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Saskatchewan, the school act of Saskatchewan was amended by chapter 35, and assented to in January, 1913. Section 3 of this act amends subsection 2 of section 45 of the act of 1909 by adding thereto the following proviso: "Provided that in the case of any separate school district having theretofore been or hereafter being established within which a separate school is maintained in operation, the ratepayers of the religious faith of the minority supporting and maintaining the public school district within which such separate school district is established shall be assessable for public school purposes only."

How Premier Borden, who is one of the most eminent lawyers in Parliament, will decide, in conjunction with the Department of Justice and his cabinet, remains to be seen.

WILL NOT STRIKE

Grandfather Carpenters' Demands Have Been Granted by the Builders.

Brantford, June 22.—Union carpenters here were granted their demands in a new agreement with the Builders' Exchange, after several weeks of negotiations, although the ultimatum to strike had been given twice. The carpenters will work nine hours a day, and will receive 35 cents per hour, which were the main points in dispute.

UNION MEN IN CANADA NUMBER 160,120 NOW

Eighty-Eight Per Cent of the Workers Are Not Organized.

Labor Statistics Show That Canada Now Has 1,638 Local Branches.

Ottawa, June 21.—Some interesting facts respecting labor and its organizations in Canada are contained in the annual special report on the subject by the Department of Labor. The union membership in the last calendar year increased from 132,132 to 160,120 at the end of 1912. The report says in part:

"It is now well understood by those interested in the subject that the great majority of units of organized labor in Canada are affiliated with international organizations having their headquarters in the United States. The mass of membership is in all these cases south of the line, the Canadian membership receiving generally its proportion of officials."

Widely Extended.
This system of internationalism in labor organization in Canada is apparently confined to no particular class of workers, and extends throughout practically all industries; in some cases, however, the workers have formed a form of unionism independent of the international bodies and have proceeded on non-international lines.

International unions in North America number 118, and 99 have affiliated locals in Canada. Of the latter eighty-two are in affiliation with the American Federation of Labor. The Canadian membership in this federation is about 95,000, or one-twentieth of the whole.

The tables submitted show that the 156,399 workers in Canada who are members of international organizations are contained in 1,638 local branches, which is an increase of 197 locals and 16,974 members over the figures reported for 1911.

Canadian Organizations.
Of Canadian organizations there are 217 local branches with a total membership of 15,618, a slight increase for the year; and in addition there are twenty-eight independent bodies, of which 16 report a membership of 8,115, thus bringing to the figure of 160,120 the total membership reported for the 1,638 local branches and independent trade union organizations of all types in Canada at the close of the year 1912. The total membership reported for 1911 was 132,132, contained in 1,471 local and independent bodies.

Only 12 Per Cent Organized.
The total number of wage-earners in Canada may be fairly estimated at the current year at 1,300,000.

With regard to the large majority of wage-earners who remain thus apparently unorganized by organization and representation 88 per cent of the whole, organization is chiefly lacking in the case of unskilled labor. Farm labor and the class of workers described generally in the census and other official returns as laborers that is without technical instruction, of any kind, alone comprise about one-fourth of the total male wage-earners, and these are practically unorganized.

Female Workers.
Female workers, too, are but little organized in Canada. The number of women workers in 1909 was placed at 138,042, and may be (again allowing an increase of forty per cent) placed at 200,000 at the end of 1912. The extent of organization among women workers of Canada is not easily ascertained, but the information at hand shows that it is little. Organization on the part of female workers is found chiefly in the manufacturing group, in such callings, for instance, as garment workers, cigar-makers, bookbinders, etc.

The trades union membership throughout the country aggregates 11,435,498. Germany is first, Great Britain second, the United States third. The report gives a complete list of all unions in Canada and their officers.

Militants Pelted With Eggs by Crowd

Ten Thousand People Were Waiting for Suffragettes at Canbourne.

London, June 22.—The suffragettes who are marching from Lady's End to Canbourne Saturday. A crowd of ten thousand persons waited for them, and the first attempt to get on the part of the women was greeted with a volley of eggs. The van containing the would-be speakers was rushed up a side street and overturned. The suffragettes fled to a hotel and escaped from there hours later in disguise.

An attempt to cause a breach in the embankment of a canal by means of an explosion of gunpowder is reported from Yardley, Worcestershire, a few miles from Birmingham. Some suffrage literature was discovered in the neighborhood. The cavity caused by the explosion almost penetrated the bank of the canal, and a little more force would have released eleven miles of water and have devastated the valley below.

Delayed by Fog.
Cleveland, June 22. Ships again lost twelve hours in the fog about the Soo yesterday. It was also thick at Port Huron. The line-up for Monday and Tuesday is very heavy and ships will be forced to wait for turns at the unloading docks.

Because of delays due to fog and the big fleet that will be at this end of the route this week, there was a good demand for boats to load ore at Lake Superior points. There has been no particular shortage of tonnage at any time, and the demand is the same as that which occurs when the ships are bunched at this end of the route. With a big movement, boats are wanted all the time, and are necessary to keep the mines going steadily.

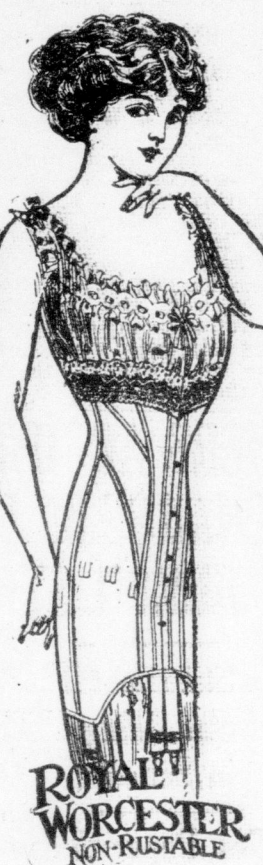
FEAR EFFECT OF NEW LAW

are American citizens. If a ship is engaged in a run of less than four hundred miles, only two licensed mates are required. Heavy penalties are to be imposed on owners of vessels who fail to comply with the law.

Although no action has been taken by the Government, it is proposed to enforce the law. Ship-owners are apprehensive, and steps are being taken to have the law modified. Owners are liable to a fine of \$500 for enough American mates to man the ships according to the new requirement. Inspectors are required to make reports of violations every day in regular form.

Lake vessels will not be involved as much as ocean-going ships and tugs, it is said. The lake boats are manned in most cases with the required number of mates.

According to the Hardy law, owners are liable to a fine of \$500 for each violation. Few actual violations on which fines could be assessed have been reported, and no effort to sue and collect fines has been made.
