WILL PURCHASE WELLS THROUGH ARBITRATION

Utilities Commission So Decides on Thursday.
COURTS TO NAME VALUE
Recent Tests of Water Show Some Improvement, But Dr. Hill Is Suspicious.

The utilities commission at their session yesterday afternoon decided to purchase the Macgregor wells by arbitration. The price will be set by a court of arbitration, to be appointed later.
There was a long discussion on the subject, much of the old ground being gone over. Dr. Hill, M.H.O., presented a series of reports on the quality of the water. The first showed considerable improvement, but the later samples showed much improvement. However, he viewed the wells with some suspicion.
"We are convinced that there is a large body of water in the wells of a good quality," said Commissioner Dennis. The price, \$30,000, is outrageous, he said. The courts will decide on the proper value.
Chairman Pocock presented options on property adjoining, five acres, owned by Mrs. A. Topping, for \$4,000, and for \$2,000 for the purchase of a house across \$500 each for additional wells. SEVEN BATTALIONS LEAVE CAMP BORDEN

Hurons, Kitcheners and Lambtons Included.

GREYS RETURN TO DEPART

Government Agriculturists Give Advice for Keeping Down Sand.

CAMP BORDEN, Oct. 5.—Seven battalions left Camp Borden today on furlough—the 161st Hurons on their last leave, and the 118th Kitcheners, 149th Lambtons, 164th Maltons, 176th Niagara Rangers, 186th Kents, and 213th Americans. All of these units will return to camp on Tuesday, by which time all the other units now on leave will have returned.

The 147th Grey Battalion returned to camp tonight from last leave, and is making preparation to go east to complete training. The eighth and ninth brigades are deserted, except for a few men guarding the lines.

The 147th Battalion is up to strength and will take over the full quota of officers.

Some Drafting Needed.
In some cases, where feasible, small drafts will be transferred from units still recruiting to bring overseas units up to the mark. Every unit on last leave needing men is making tremendous efforts to gather new recruits, and some new material is expected when they return to the front.

Sir John Hendrie, lieutenant-governor of Ontario, Lady Hendrie and Lady Hughes, wife of the minister of militia, were visitors at camp today.

Dr. G. C. Credé, president of the Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph, and Deputy Minister of Agriculture R. Roadhouse, were the guests of Major McLaughlin, and after seeing the camp, stated that if Canadian high grass and basic slag was used it should keep the dust down. Basic slag has been used with fine results in England, and it is expected that experiments will be made this fall.

There are 845 men absent without leave today, and 95 men in the hospital. Both of these are low figures.

AWESOME SPIDER

Patriarch of Tarantula Family Captured by Fruit Merchant.

An awe-inspiring member of the tarantula family was brought to The Advertiser's office yesterday by Charles Frank, retail fruit merchant, of 215 Dundas street, who had captured the big spider a few minutes earlier at the Moore Fruit Company.

"I've been in the fruit business fifteen years, and this is the first real tarantula I have seen—that is, to amount to anything," said Mr. Frank, as he allowed the spider to crawl over his hand. "I had the alien imprisoned. I have just seen one other," he continued, "a little one. Just look at the size of this."

It undoubtedly was a sizable insect, measuring at least two inches long, black, delicately striped with yellow, and covered with fine hairs.

Drawing attention to the Seven Sister's hirsute adornment, the exhibitor advanced the view that his tarantula was a very old one, at least one hundred years old. In any case, it didn't appear particularly frisky, and this was not attributed to extreme age, but to the fact that it was so chilly in this unfriendly northern climate to do much hopping about.

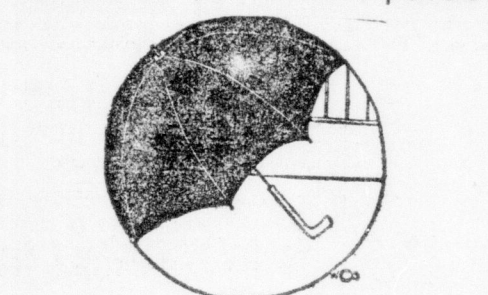
