Funeral services were conducted by Rev. James Smith, pastor of the First Presbtyerian Church, in the absence of Rev. Charles Dresser of the Episcopa Church, of which Mrs. Lincoln was a member.

Shortly after, Lincoln, visiting in Lexington, Ky., picked up a thick leather-bound volume called "The Christian's Defence." He noted that it was written by the Springfield minister who had so recently come into his home. On his return to Springfield Lincoln borrowed a copy of the book from the author, and became deeply interested

It was the outgrowth of a religious debate between Rev. Smith and an infidel named Olmstead, at Columbus Miss. Dr. Smith was a Scotchman, who had been a deist. When he was chal-lenged to this debate he took 18 months


