CITY OF LONDON BILL PASSES HOUSE

Will Renew War On Britain's Coalition

UNIONISTS TO ASK RETURN OF OLD PARTIES

Sir William Joynson-Hicks Motion Attacks Ministry's Lack of Political Entail.

VOTE CLEARED AIR

Premier's Slashing Victory On Genoa Conference Has Thunderstorm Effect.

LONDON, April 4.—The overwhelming victory of Prime Minister Lloyd George in the Commons yesterday, when he was given the confidence of the house by a vote of 372 to 94, has had the effect of a quick, violent thunderstorm in clearing the political atmosphere.

Back Premier's Genoa Policy

LONDON, England, April 3.—(By the Associated Press.)—The House of Commons tonight adopted, 372 to 94, Premier Lloyd George's resolution calling for confidence in the Government's policy on the coming economic conference at Genoa.

Prior to this the house, 379 to 84, rejected an amendment proposed by John Robert Clynes, Laborite, which, while approving an international economic and financial conference, declared the government was not competent to represent the country at such a conference, and did not have the confidence of the country.

This resolution is regarded as exceedingly satisfactory for the premier, as the combined Laborites and Independent Liberals number about 100 and the "die-hards" about 50, all of whom might have been expected to oppose the premier's resolution.

The premier's speech inviting Parliament to vote confidence in the Genoa policy touched only lightly upon the political crisis at home, and endorsed the French policy toward Russia, although Mr. Lloyd George displayed much sympathy for a conciliatory attitude toward Russia.

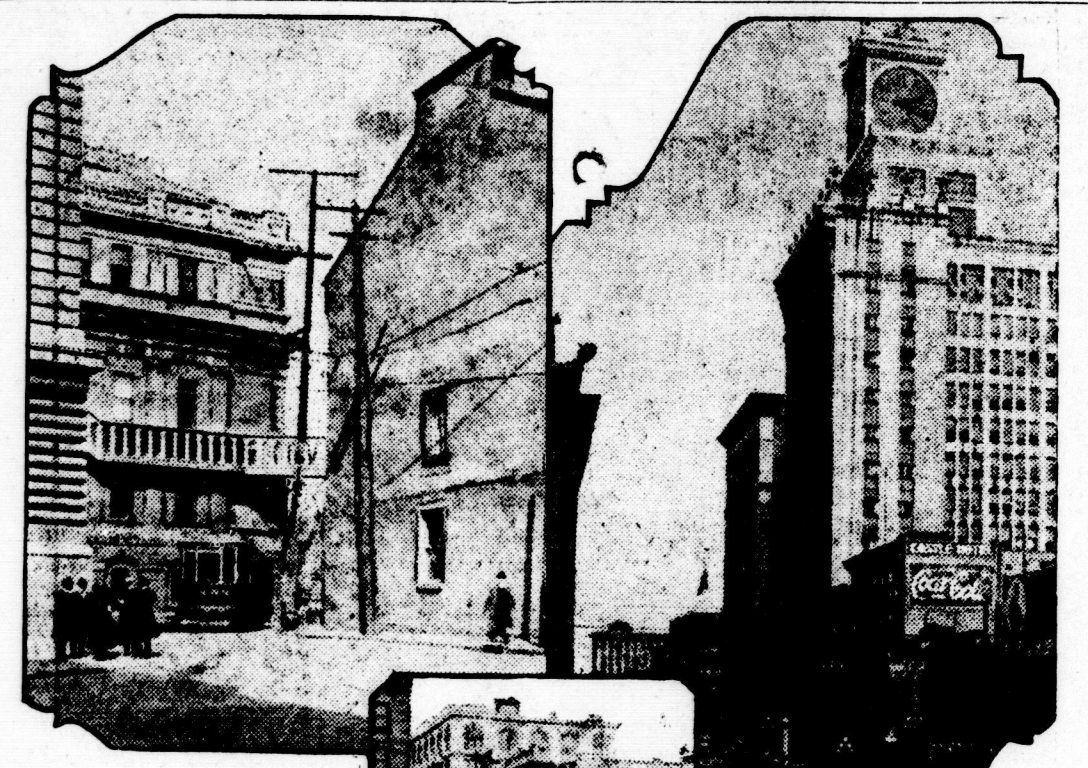

It sought accommodation with the Soviet Government, lest by waiting it might eventually be necessary to deal with a still more irreconcilable or militarist regime, which might engulf all of Europe.

While emphasizing that nothing could be gained by waiting for the overthrow of the Soviet administration, he accepted the French standpoint, demanding guarantees with respect to Russia's debts and obligations and stipulating a probation of six months or a year, but less if Russia gave the necessary guarantees, before full recognition was accorded. He indicated his belief in the sincerity of the conversion of Nikolai Lenin and the Soviet to a diluted form of communism.

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WILSON AND COX GET REMAND

May 16 Set For Mail Robbery Trial by Los Angeles Judge.

LONDONER MANACLED

Police Fear Escape Attempt by Former Local City Mission Leader.

Los Angeles, April 4.—Herbert Wilson, who formerly conducted a rescue mission in London, Canada, and Herbert B. Cox, of Detroit, both of whom have been in custody in the Alameda County Jail here for several weeks, will come to trial May 16, charged with the robbery of a government mail train in this city on the evening of March 3, 1921.

The alleged bandits appeared in Judge Trippett's court yesterday and were remanded upon the request of the prosecuting attorney.

It is evident that U. S. Marshal Walton is taking no chances with Wilson. When the defendants appeared in court the latter was manacled to a fellow prisoner, while Cox was not. The police firmly believe that the former will embrace any opportunity to escape.

It is now said that the government authorities have procured further important evidence respecting the robbery of the mail truck, when the drivers, Grimes and Alexander, were badly man-handled and cash and securities to the value of almost \$400,000 was taken.

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Montreal, April 4.—Archbishop Paul Bruchési of Montreal, who has been lying very ill at a hospital here, suffered a series of hemorrhages during the night, and his condition is said by his doctors to be very grave.

BRITISH DELEGATES LEAVE.

LONDON, April 4.—The minor officials and secretaries attached to the British delegation to the Genoa conference left London this morning for Italy.

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St. John, N. B., April 4.—Among the first passengers to land here at 6 a.m. today, following the arrival from Liverpool of the Canadian Pacific liner Tunisian, were two overseas police officers escorted by Harold R. Shillington, former bank accountant of London, Ontario, alleged to have misappropriated in that city stocks and bonds valued at \$70,000.

Making early train connections, the party left for their destination in Western Ontario.

Shillington was apprehended several weeks ago near Edinburgh, Scotland, from which city the officers have just brought him.

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Buffalo, N. Y., April 4.—Buffalo's municipal authorities have not given proper co-operation to prohibition enforcement agents, it was charged yesterday by Roy A. Haynes, national prohibition commissioner. The charge followed a four-hour conference at which Mr. Haynes, Ralph A. Day, federal prohibition director of New York, and General Agents Thomas and Lecarron were present.

"We have not had in Buffalo the degree of co-operation which we should have had from municipal officers," was the assertion made by Mr. Haynes.

Mr. Haynes said he had not seen Mayor Schwab, who was elected on a "wet" platform.

Plans were made at the conference for increased efforts to check smuggling along the Great Lakes.

"We will bring high-powered automobiles and fast automobiles to this region," the national enforcement officer said. "We will increase the number of agents as may seem necessary. We have had splendid co-operation from the Canadian authorities, but unfortunately their laws do not forbid export."

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Budapest, April 4.—With the death of Charles, crowned king of Hungary, the provisional constitution, which was based on the fact that the king was prevented from exercising his prerogatives, must be re-drafted by the assembly about to be elected.

Candidates for the throne are beginning to spring up again, strong parties forming for the support of the Archduke Albrecht and Joseph Ferdinand, but many deputies are reviving the proposal for the election of an English prince. The party favoring Francis Joseph Otto, eldest son of the dead monarch, however, is unquestionably the strongest.

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Calcutta, April 4.—The mail train from Calcutta to the Punjab last evening was derailed near Madras, the engine and six coaches toppling over a 50-foot embankment, killing the engine crew and three passengers. Many persons were injured, including three Europeans.

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GIVES NO HELP TO DRY AGENTS

Federal Prohibition Officers Charge Buffalo Officials With Non-Co-operation.

PLAN BIG CRUSADE

Conference Decides On Speed Boats and Cars To Stop Traffic.

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PART OF CITY ESCAPES HIGH TAX FOR 1922

East and West London Will Be Assessed On Previous Valuation.

AWAIT RICHTER SYSTEM

Three-Quarters of Property Owners Pay 16 To 20 Per Cent Increase.

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Three-quarters of the property-owners of the city will receive tax bills this year which will be from 16 to 20 per cent higher than those for the previous quarter.

The other quarter, which includes the residents of West London and a portion of Ward No. 3, will pay on the basis of the old assessment.

This is due to the fact that the Richter scheme of assessment has not been completed, and, therefore, is in force only partially.

Status in 1923.

The assessment for 1923 will include all property-owners in the city on the Richter basis.

The difference in the 1922 taxation may be summarized as follows: A owns a piece of property, with a house thereon, all of which is assessed at \$4,000, and his taxes are \$139.60; B owns an equally valuable piece of land in the district rated on the old assessment. The house thereon is of equal value to that of A, yet his taxes are only \$111.58; consequently the difference in the total of taxes is \$27.92.

Still Adding to Taxes.

In addition, it may be pointed out that the majority of those who had a material increase made in their assessment under the Richter method are finding that the assessors, now making their rounds, are adding from \$100 to \$300 to the total taxation on their property. Such addition does not apply, of course, to those not now paying under the Richter scheme.

Ald. Drake of Ward 3 told the council Monday night that the people on Hamilton road were protesting because the assessment department was boosting their assessments \$400 and more on small cottages. The explanation is that the Richter scheme is being applied to these houses in some portions of the ward.
