

TEST MEANS OF
FIGHTING FIRES

Inspectors for Underwriters' Association Make Investigation of Equipment.

Firemen Exhibit Efficiency of Waterworks System by Display On Market.

Twenty streams of water from as many lines of hose were played on the market square Monday night by the city fire department, conducting tests for W. Walker and R. Driscoll, inspectors for the Canadian Fire Underwriters' Association.

Upon the results of this and other tests conducted by the Toronto inspectors Monday night, it was based the rate for fire risks in London to be struck by the various fire insurance companies represented by the association.

The London water system stood up well under the heavy test Monday night is evidenced by the fact that a pressure of 71 pounds per square inch was maintained at the hydrants during the time that the twenty lines of hose were pouring tons of water onto the market square.

The tests attracted hundreds of spectators, some of whom were sprayed because of their curiosity, while others who insisted on standing too close to the hose earned wet feet, as the water on the market at one time during the test was over six inches deep.

In addition to this major test the inspectors summoned the fire department to Waterloo and Grosvenor streets on a test call. Motor trucks from the central station responded to this call in six minutes, which fact has caused Fire Chief Aitken to swell his chest with pride.

Monday afternoon the inspectors tested the water pressure at various points throughout the city, and the results, according to Chief Aitken, proved very satisfactory.

Inspector Driscoll, who is an electrical expert, also investigated the transmission facilities of the city fire alarm system, and interviewed members of the public utilities staff regarding this system.

During the period that the twenty lines of hose were in use on the market square, three auxiliary pumps at the Ridout street pumping station, which are turned on with every fire alarm, were in operation.

Fire Chief Aitken informed The Advertiser Tuesday that every test conducted by the inspectors yielded excellent results, thereby adding to the laurels of the fire department and waterworks system of London.

WILL TAKE VOTE
ON AGREEMENT

Maintenance of Way Men in District To Mark Ballots Next Week.

Offer Submitted Employees Eliminates Time and Half for Sundays, Holidays.

The maintenance of way men and the members of the federated shop trades in this district will begin voting the first of the week to decide whether or not the working agreement submitted by the Canadian Railways Association will be accepted.

Joseph Corbett, general chairman of the Grand Trunk carmen of Canada, stated this morning that the workers had received the explanatory literature accompanying the ballots. He explained that it was the purpose of the union to give the men plenty of time in order that they may understand thoroughly all the clauses of the revised agreement and be able to vote intelligently.

The new agreement deals chiefly with working conditions and overtime pay. One clause eliminates time-and-a-half pay for Sundays and holidays, and if this clause is passed by the men, in the future only straight time will be paid for the two days specified.

Hundreds of workers, including machinists, boilermakers, blacksmiths, sheet metal workers, electricians, carmen and maintenance of way men are affected by the proposal of the Canadian Railways Association.

The United States Labor Railway Board have just completed a conference in Chicago at which wages of the railway shop mechanics, freight car men and the maintenance of way men was cut more than \$100,000,000 annually.

As a result more than 400,000 workers in the States are making a vigorous protest, and in the opinion of Mr. Corbett will strike about July 1.

The men have been provoked into a fighting mood, and it is hard to say what the result will be," he said.

Mr. Corbett would not say whether a sympathetic strike was probable in Canada if the United States workers refused to accept the cut in wages, but as the Federated Shop Trades is an international union, Canada would be affected by such an action across the line.

Mr. Corbett, who travels constantly all over Eastern Canada, in the interests of the car men, will leave the latter part of the week for Montreal.

ASK DAMAGES FOR ALLEGED
BREACH OF AGREEMENT

Bonser Products Company Suing Carling Distributing Company For Unstated Sum.

Walter Bonser, conducting business under the name of the Bonser Products Company, has through his solicitors, Menzies and Cluff, entered an action in the civil court, against John Cecil Carling, who transacts business under the name of the Carling Distributing Company.

The plaintiffs seek to recover the sum of \$243.29 for goods alleged to have been sold and delivered by them to the defendant.

They seek also to recover damages for an alleged breach of an agreement whereby the defendant had agreed, they say, to purchase all supplies of maple syrup products handled and sold by them, from the plaintiff.

They seek further an injunction in the meanwhile to restrain the defendant from purchasing such commodities from concerns other than themselves.

"MED." GRADUATES
END EXAMINATION

Examinations of candidates for the Ontario Medical Council were concluded at Victoria Hospital Tuesday. These examinations are required on graduates of medical schools in the province before they will be permitted to practice medicine in Ontario.

About twenty candidates tried the examinations, including eighteen graduates of Western University Medical School, who state that although the exams "were stiff" they are optimistic regarding the results, which will be announced next week.

The examinations, which are oral and written in nature, were conducted at Victoria Hospital and Western University Medical School.

EXPECT AUTHORITY
TO DEPORT GEER

Jail Officials Advised That Case Is Being Dealt With at Ottawa.

At most any moment now, the necessary documents are expected from the department of immigration at Ottawa that will authorize the removal from the Middlesex county jail to the American border of Harry Geer, said by the United States police authorities to be a resident of Johnstown, Pennsylvania.

Governor Byron Dawson explains that he was in long distance communication with Inspector Reynolds earlier in the week, who advised him that the question of Geer's transfer was being attended to immediately.

The prisoner, already adjudged mentally unbalanced by the local jail physician, is the man who first sprung into the limelight by persistently bothering the St. Thomas police officials with sensational stories of alleged adventures in American jails and penitentiaries.

When finally ordered from the confines of that community, he pestered the local officers until they deemed it fit to place him under arrest.

GIVES JUDGMENT IN SUIT
AGAINST LONDON LOAN CO.

Justice Middleton Exonerates Local Banking Institution From All Accusations.

Judgment has been given by the supreme court in favor of the London Loan and Savings Company of Canada, in connection with the suit brought against them by the liquidator of the Standard Reliance Mortgage Corporation of Toronto.

Mr. Justice Middleton expressed surprise that the syndicate, composed of Mr. M. J. Kent, the late Judge Holt, Senator Proudfoot, and the late W. L. Horton, which had so satisfactorily arranged the transfer of the Huron and Bruce Company to The Standard Loan Company in 1904, should have been accused of not revealing all the facts to the shareholders.

He stated that the syndicate has been fully exonerated from all accusations and dismissed the action against the London company and the said M. J. Kent, and gave judgment in favor of the London company.

All costs are to be paid by the Toronto company.

Mr. Kilmer acted for the plaintiffs, and G. A. P. Brickenden for the London Loan and Savings Company.
