SMALL TOWNS EFFECT UNION

Band Together To Secure Share of Canadian Branch Industries.

Mayor of Listowel To Head Committee For Western Ontario.

TORONTO, Sept. 6.—A meeting of representatives of the smaller towns of Ontario was held here today with the object of forming an organization for the purpose of securing interest in industries which are coming to Canada at the present time from both England and the United States.

Another point discussed was that from the standpoint of health of the community in every way more desirable that the towns should be built up rather than the cities become too large.

In order to work up interest in the proposition the province was organized by districts, and accordingly the following appointments were made:

For Ottawa Valley district—W. West of Almonte and A. E. Bradwin of Arnprior. They will call a meeting which will be held at Ottawa of the representatives of such towns as Pembroke, Smith's Falls, Perth, Carleton Place, Renfrew and other towns in this vicinity.

The Niagara peninsula district—William Scott of Port Colborne, Thomas Marshall of Dunnville and F. W. Warren of Dundas, who will call a meeting either in St. Catharines or Hamilton and invite representatives from the towns in their district.

For Western Ontario—Mayor Malcolm of Listowel and the presidents of the boards of trade of Elmira and Wingham will organize their district.

It is proposed eventually to form a provincial organization when a permanent managing secretary will be engaged.

TWO KILLED WHEN TRAIN HITS AUTO

Three Other Occupants of Car Injured in Crash Near Chesterville.

CHESTERVILLE, Sept. 6.—Two are dead and three others are injured following a collision between an automobile and the C. P. R. Montreal and Chicago flyer about a mile and a quarter west of here at noon today. All were residents of South Bombay, N. Y. The dead are: George Murray, aged 33, and Mrs. Helen Reynolds, 40.

The injured: Mrs. Charles Murray, 45, mother of the dead man; left leg amputated and scalp wounds; condition serious. Mrs. George Murray, wife of the dead man, scalp wounds and shock; condition not serious.

Mrs. Annabelle Greenwood, aged 17, collarbone broken.

When the train met with the accident they were motoring from South Bombay, N. Y., to Ottawa.

The front of the locomotive struck the automobile opposite the engine and turned the car completely over, throwing out all its occupants. After turning the car over the locomotive carried it about three pole lengths.

PROBE MYSTERY OF BODY IN CANAL

Brantford Police Investigating Circumstances in Connection With Schronia's Death.

BRANTFORD, Sept. 6.—With the finding of a badly mutilated body in the Welland Canal yesterday morning, Provincial Officers Gurnett and Willmot are in Brantford today investigating the case. When the body was found it was tied in gunny-sacks and wrapped in a couple of motor rugs and was tied securely with binder twine.

Descriptions of the man were broadcast by the police, and this morning it was found that the murdered man was Joe Schronia, who lived at 172 George street, city. Schronia left his home here yesterday morning between 6.30 and 7 o'clock and was never seen alive again. He did not tell his wife where he was going.

The murdered man and a cousin, Sam Schronia, while walking on George street about two months ago were fired upon by a number of unknown men who passed in a car. Several shots were fired at the time and no arrests resulted. The Schronias refusing to tell what they knew of the "mystery" car, which is supposed to have been driven by a woman.

Provincial Officers Gurnett and Willmot, working from this end, arrested James Forte, a Market street fruit dealer, after they had found a revolver in a suitcase at his residence. The revolver was a Luger of .25 calibre.

Forte appeared before F. J. Calbrek, J.P., and William Buskard, J.P., in police court this morning charged with having firearms without a permit and was fined \$100 and costs, with an alternative of two months in jail. Forte paid the fine and it is understood that he is going to appeal the case.

TORONTO WILL NOT SEEK VALIDATING LEGISLATION

TORONTO, Sept. 6.—Validating legislation for the waterfront deal, which passed the city council this morning, will not be sought from the Ontario Government until the city asks for the usual special legislation, in the ordinary way, this fall, according to Mayor Maguire.

The mayor was of the opinion that the vote in favor of giving an entrance along the water front to hydro electric radials was a sufficient step for the present.

G. T. R. APPOINTMENT

George F. Ancrum Becomes Assistant Treasurer.

For the past two years Mr. Ancrum has been assistant to the treasurer.

COLONIZATION SCHEME MOOTED

Commissioner Visits Canada to Talk Immigration.

Will Meet Cabinet Members at Ottawa and Make Tour of Provinces.

Montreal, Sept. 6.—A huge colonization scheme to settle Italian immigrants in Canada is projected by the government of Italy, which has sent Joseph De Michalis, general commissioner of immigration, to make a minute survey of industrial and agricultural conditions in the Dominion with a view to ascertaining the quota and the type of immigrant that is most needed here.

Mr. De Michalis passed through Montreal today en route to Ottawa, where he will meet members of the cabinet and confer with departmental heads of the department of labor and immigration. Following these meetings, he will cover each of the provinces from Ontario westward, accompanied by Jules Edouard, Italian consul to Canada. Mr. De Michalis said only the type of settler wanted in Canada would be sent.

When Mr. De Michalis completes his survey in Canada he will make a similar one of the United States, but the field in Canada is believed to be the wider in view of the peculiar immigration restrictions of the U. S. A. In explaining his mission, Mr. De Michalis declared it had three chief aims:

1. To ascertain the class of immigration most needed by the Dominion which Italy could supply.
2. To secure Canadian capital, which would be joined to Italian capital, with the view to establishing Italian farmers on Canadian land; and
3. To collect first hand data on actual conditions in the Dominion, and to determine whether it is in the best interests of the Italian government to embark on the contemplated colonization scheme.

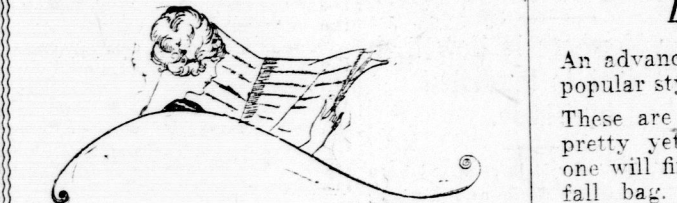
Mr. De Michalis said: "We do not want to send you those who may become a burden on your state. If you have no place for industrial workers, none will be sent out. If your sole need is agricultural workers and the conditions of settlement here are satisfactory, we will send you the type you need."

DISCOVERS BODIES OF 2 MEN IN LAKE

Victims Believed To Be Finns—Police Suspect Foul Play.

SUDBURY, Sept. 6.—According to a report made to District Inspector Storie by Provincial Constable Fraser today, the bodies of two men in an advanced state of decomposition, one of whom had evidently suffered a heavy blow on the face before death, weighed down by stones, were discovered by a Finn, named Walter Gronlund, in a small lake situated 25 miles due northeast of Regent, on the Algoma Central Railway, on August 24.

It is thought that the bodies are those of two Finnish men, Victor Joki and Hannes Nemi Keuru, who were reported missing from Port Arthur in the early part of July of this year. The last trace of whose whereabouts ended in the vicinity where the bodies were found.

Joki was a widower, 35 years of age. He left two children. Keuru was 30 years of age and was single. The police suspect foul play and are investigating.

WILL TAKE WEEK OR MORE TO REACH ENTOMBED MEN

JACKSON, Cal., Sept. 6.—From seven to thirteen days more will be required to reach the 47 men entombed in the Argonaut mine here, according to opinion expressed in well-informed circles tonight. Government, state and mine company engineers declined to comment officially on the expression.

LITTLE ROCK ONLY CITY TO INCREASE FOOD COST

WASHINGTON, Sept. 6.—Little Rock was the only one of 26 representative cities in the United States to report an increase on the level of retail food prices for the month from July 15 to Aug. 15, and that was less than 5-10 of 1 per cent, according to figures made public today by the bureau of labor statistics of the department of labor.

Decreases amounted to 5 per cent in Milwaukee and Springfield.
