

ORDERED TO HOUSE ALL BEER ASHORE

Will Be Allowed Right-of-Way From Warehouses To St. Clair River.

APPEAL TO OTTAWA

Sarnia, Nov. 14.—Local temperance workers were today preparing a resolution to be sent to the dominion government seeking the removal of liquor stores from the St. Clair river, this action being based on an appreciation of the fact that the control of the scows lies beyond the province of the Ontario temperance act. R. E. Lesueur, secretary of the plebiscite committee, said today that no steps will be spared to try and force export operators out of the business.

In the meantime scow operators here have been advised by federal officials that in future they must warehouse their liquor ashore instead of afloat, and they will be given a right-of-way from their warehouses to the water front.

Scow operators are busy searching for suitable buildings for warehouses.

The decision given by Magistrate Gundy in the Windsor police court by which \$200,000 worth of liquor, seized from export warehouses along the Detroit river, is ordered returned to the owners, was not hailed as a case of somewhat similar nature to be heard here in county police court Monday. Magistrate C. S. Woodrow stated today when interrogated on the question. Magistrate Woodrow said that the circumstances are somewhat different in the local case. In the first place, we have already convicted a man for purchasing liquor from that scow. He said the owner has been shown to have held liquor through his employees, and if we find out who the owner is then we find out who the liquor is legally liable for confiscation under the Ontario temperance act. "I am still under the opinion that the liquor export men cannot legally break bulk consignments and sell in small quantities, and I shall require some very convincing proof before agreeing that they can do so."

MANY PROBLEMS FOR GOVERNMENT

Housing Trade Revival, Price of Foods Likely Topics For Discussion.

London, Nov. 14.—It is anticipated that the speech from the throne at the opening of parliament on December 9 will indicate the Baldwin government's intentions with regard to the housing, trade revival, unemployment and food problems, and an inquiry concerning food prices and perhaps some suggestion of national insurance against ill-health and unemployment.

With regard to the housing problem the government, it is understood, will assure the trades unions that any schemes for providing more housing accommodation for the people will embrace a period of at least fifteen years, which is anticipated, and will modify the unions' position on the admission of diluted labor, or at any rate the extension of the apprenticeship system and the promotion of semi-skilled labor.

Regarding the proposed inquiry as to food prices, there are indications that this question will be looked into at a very early period by a royal commission, and the question of prices will be explored with reference to the imperial aspect thereon. An imperial economic committee will be appointed to consider the marketing of empire produce with the object of seeing primarily how the food commodities of the dominions can best be brought more prominently before the attention of the consumers in the mother country than is the case at present.

Woman Gives Birth To Baby While Flames Devour House

Jersey City, N.J., Nov. 14.—While flames roared across a street intersection and thrust angrily through windows from which the panes had vanished, Mrs. Helen McCann of 211 Washington street gave birth to a baby boy today.

An ambulance doctor, alternately watching the woman and the progress of the fire, stood at her side. At a signal from him, police carried woman and child to the street. Later, at city hospital, Mrs. McCann's condition was reported satisfactory.

Ten minutes after the woman and child had been taken out the building, of frame construction, collapsed.

Authorities May Ask Peter Smith Repay \$58,000

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J. M. WEBER AGAIN HEADS LIBERALS

London Club President Re-elected by Acclamation—Other Officers Chosen.

John M. Weber, president of the London Liberal club, was re-elected by acclamation at a rousing meeting in the club rooms at Hyman hall last night. While the meeting was for the purpose of receiving nominations for the election a month hence, several executives were at once re-elected by the members, who expressed their appreciation of the enthusiasm which had marked the strengthening of the Liberal cause in London.

For first vice-president, Peter Cameron and Dr. A. J. Murray were nominated. J. W. Griffith was re-elected by acclamation, as was Secretary Allan Mercer. The treasurer C. C. Ferguson, was re-elected.

Twenty members were nominated for the executive, which is made up of 12 members. They are as follows: James Murray, E. Saunders, George Hare, H. V. Charlton, Harvey Dalton, Alex. Tither, George Burdick, Jun., D. Palmer, William Miller, A. Throver, W. C. Morrison, John Russell, A. Chapman, Sydney Beard, Hugh Semple, Dr. A. W. McPhee, J. J. Johnson, Fred Pace and Andrew Beattie.

Andrew Robinson spoke briefly on the aims of the Liberal club, and the progress made during the last year. In expressing the hope that the Right Honorable W. L. Mackenzie King might soon visit London, he paid a tribute to the prime minister, saying that he had tackled one of the biggest jobs ever handled by a statesman. He had stepped into office in the wake of the money-wasting Union government and the disastrous Meighen regime, and the fact that he was growing in power every day was the proof of his worth.

George Perle spoke of the successful gathering at Woodstock last summer, when the premier spoke and thanked those who had worked so hard for the success of the day. He hoped that the prime minister would see fit to visit London at an early date. He had the pleasure of hearing the Liberal chief speak at Timmins a short time ago, where he had been given a splendid welcome in the mining districts, where the electors pledged him two members at the next election.

President John Weber outlined the work of the past year. He showed that the club had shown favorable progress; that the young were taking an active interest in the club, and concluding with a tribute to the past president, Andrew Robinson, whose hard work in the interest of the club had made it most efficient.

SCHOOL TENDERS ARE DISCUSSED

Only Few of Items in Empress Avenue List Finally Disposed Of.

Only two or three of the items included in the list of furniture and equipment for the new Empress public school were finally disposed of by the tendering process at its regular meeting yesterday afternoon.

The tender of the George M. Hendry company, Toronto, for 240 pupils had a ballot box and all ballot boxes were turned in to a returning officer. In previous years it has been the custom to ballot for the officers at the annual banquet. This system was changed and gave everyone a chance to vote, because sometimes it has not been possible for all to attend the banquet.

The purchase of 24 standard manual training benches, together with the tenders submitted, was referred to a committee consisting of Secretary S. P. Lawanson, chairman of the committee; Secretary W. A. Tanner, Inspector V. K. Greer and George T. Cowie, manual training instructor.

Trustee Lawanson and Secretary Tanner were empowered to examine samples of 240 oak chairs as tendered for by the Hay Stationery & Supply company, and the Smallman & Ingram company, both tenders being the same, at \$4.65 each.

The purchase of an enameled table, two enameled chairs and wicker couch for the nurse's room, together with tenders received on those particular items, was referred to Secretary Tanner and Miss E. B. Rowe, head school nurse, for a report.

Trustee Lawanson and Secretary Tanner were also asked to examine samples of 450 folding chairs for the auditorium, and 40 kindergarten chairs and two oak tables, submitted by firms tendering on those items.

The boys reported that 29 geese and 40 ducks were raffled, and a crowd of over 100 people, mostly from London, "chances" costing 20 cents each.

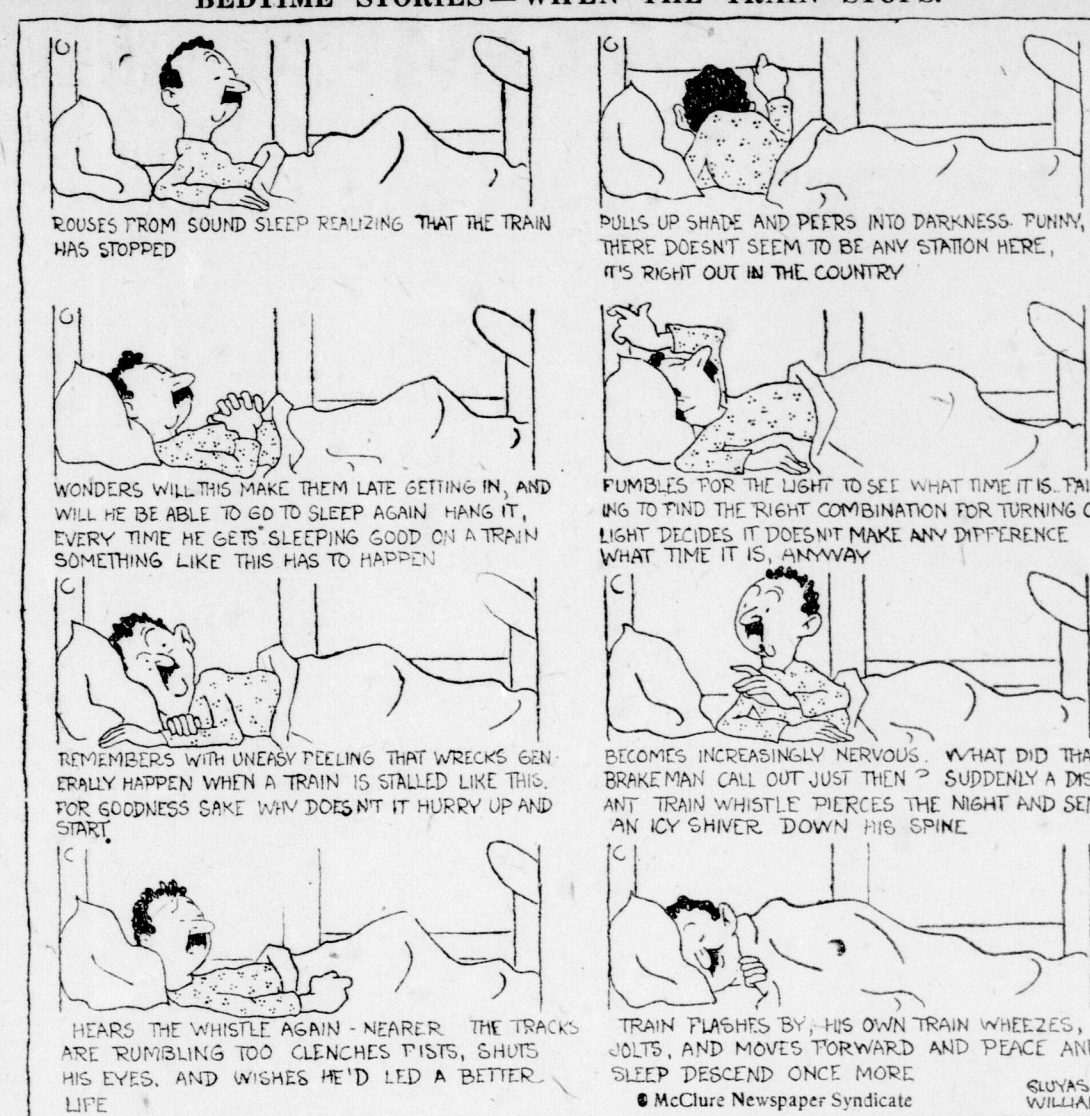
ELECT OFFICERS.

DENIES ALLEGIANCE TO LLOYD GEORGE

Liberal Member of House Revolts Against Leadership of Welshman.

London, Nov. 14.—An incident revolt which has been brewing in Liberal ranks against former Premier Lloyd George holding joint leadership of the Liberal party with H. H. Asquith, today developed in a decisive manner.

Mr. Lloyd George was rejected by the Conservative party in the famous caucus in October, 1922, which put an end to the coalition government. The Labor party would never have anything to do with Mr. Lloyd George. Now Captain Wood Benn, an influential member of the Liberal party, has written a letter to the Liberal party declaring he cannot in any way acknowledge Mr. Lloyd George as his leader in the House of Commons.

Captain Benn declares it was not defective party organization that brought about the Liberal disaster. "The vital fault," he says, "is want of trust. The people have no confidence, and rightly so, in Mr. Lloyd George."

DREAM OF BONES IN CELLAR LEADS TO WEIRD DISCOVERY

Windsor, Nov. 14.—Mrs. Alice Cooper, who lives at 86 Monmouth road, Walkerville, turned over to the police today a half-bushel basket of bones, which she says she dug out of her cellar, following a vivid dream.

The bones were submitted to a Walkerville physician this afternoon, who pronounced some of them, at least, to be those of human beings.

An investigation is under way.

Mrs. Cooper's story is a weird one. She was awakened by a dream, she says, that bodies of murdered persons were hidden in her cellar. Her efforts with a small shovel were rewarded by the discovery of a quantity of bones, which appeared to have been in the ground for a long time. In an opposite corner of the cellar another collection of bones was dug up.

Irish Condemn Armistice Fete

Belfast, Nov. 14.—At a meeting of the governmental party, held last night at Rathfriland, a Dublin suburb, a protest was voted against the Armistice Day celebration in Dublin. The protesting resolution described the celebration as "a British demonstration under the guise of memorial services to the men who died in the army of our late enemies."

The resolution called on the government to enact the necessary legislation to prevent such demonstrations, which were styled "insults to the memory of those who made the Irish Free State."

LABOR HAS THREE IN CIVIC CONTEST

Meeting Last Night Is Not Productive of Further Nominations.

No further aldermanic nominations were forthcoming at a meeting of the Labor party last night, and only a definite three will be contestants at the coming municipal elections.

C. C. Wainless and Tom Cliff, who were nominated to contest ward one and ward four, respectively, at a former meeting have not as yet signified their intention of standing.

Ald. Frank McKay, L. R. Menzies and John Ashton will compete in ward three.

David Mills and A. Evans were nominated as candidates for the board of education after Mrs. F. White, Mrs. F. Wells and Raymond Smith had expressed their desire to be out of the race.

Only seventeen members of the Labor party attended last night's meeting. A letter received from the secretary of the board of education, in reply to one sent expressing the attitude of the Labor party in London on the cadet movement, was read at the meeting and the opinion was expressed that it was entirely unsatisfactory.

NEW WATER TROUGH.

The new water trough for horses on the Pipe Line road, 100 yards east of the Wonderland sidetrack, is now in working order, and has replaced the old wooden trough which stood on the south-east corner of the road for many years. The new trough, which is made of field stone, was built by Jack Bouk, road foreman on the Pipe Line road.

COMMISSION WORK.

It was stated earlier in the week that the row of evergreen trees on the south side of the Pipe Line road, near the Wonderland sidetrack, were being cut out by Westminster township council. The work was authorized by the suburban area commission in order that the road at this point would be free from snow drifts and pitch holes during the winter months.

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BANKER'S REQUEST DENIED BY JUDGE

Certificate of Reasonable Doubt Is Refused Convicted Bank Director.

Toronto, Nov. 14.—Application for a certificate of "reasonable doubt" in the case of Lieut.-Col. Clarence P. Smith, convicted Home Bank director of Montreal, was refused today by Judge Coatsworth.

Colonel Smith was convicted last week of approving of and concurring in a false bank return to the government. Sentence has not been passed. At the conclusion of the trial his counsel asked for a certificate of reasonable doubt.

Judge Coatsworth stated this morning that he had given the matter careful thought and regretted that he could not see his way clear to granting the request. He added, however, that he would do anything he could to facilitate any appeal action which counsel might bring.

LONDON CHURCH CALLS WALKERVILLE MINISTER

Dundas Centre Methodist Seeks Rev. E. A. Pearson—Rev. John Garbutt Leaving.

At the meeting of the quarterly board of Dundas Centre Methodist church last night it was decided to extend a call to Rev. E. A. Pearson of Walkerville, to take charge of the congregation the first Sunday of July next year.

It is understood that Rev. John Garbutt, the present pastor, who is to expire next summer, will accept a call he has received from an eastern Ontario church.

The appointment of Rev. Mr. Pearson to the local charge will, of course, be subject to his acceptance and to the approval of the stationing committee which will meet in this city next June.

DYNAMITE IS USED TO CHECK BLAZE

Thirty Buildings Razed Before Flames Brought Under Control.

HUNDREDS HOMELESS

Jersey City, N.J., Nov. 14.—Fire, attended by numerous explosions, raged for hours in the industrial section of Jersey City before it could be brought under control today, destroying more than thirty buildings, sending scores of persons to hospitals for treatment for minor injuries, and making several hundred families homeless.

The damage runs into millions of dollars. The cause of the fire has not yet been determined.

A full square block was razed, and portions of six other blocks immediately adjoining it were destroyed. Two-thirds of Jersey's fire department fought the conflagration from 9 o'clock this morning to 6 o'clock this evening, when relief crews were put to the task of subduing the fire which smoldered in the ruins throughout the night. Two fireboats from New York City helped to subdue the flames, from the congested factory district in the North river front, while the reserve fire forces of the city joined by firemen from the adjoining city of Hoboken, stood by for possible emergencies.

Dynamite had to be used to blast down a number of clumsy structures in the path of the flames.

The noise of frequent explosions, which shattered buildings within a half-mile radius, was added to dense clouds of acid fumes and thick, black, chemical-filled smoke, added to the confusion and panic.

The fire started in a sub-cellar of the salt petre factory of the Battelle & Renwick Company at Morris and Warren streets. Soon after an explosion blew the roof of the salt petre company's four-story building. The flames immediately swept over the building in waves, and flaming fragments of the shattered roof fell on adjoining buildings and set them ablaze.

A dozen firemen and probably 30 men, women and children in neighboring houses, cut by flying glass or overthrown furniture, were rushed to hospitals or to emergency first-aid stations set up in neighboring drug stores.

Laboratory chemists about. Red cross nurses and volunteer physicians hastily appeared on the scene with first-aid kits.

FORMER LONDON MAN TESTIFIES AT HEARING

F. W. Reynolds Tells of Home Bank's Lumber Company in B. C.

Toronto, Nov. 14.—The story of the Reynolds Timber Company and its connection with the Home Bank of Canada was brought out today at the trial of J. F. M. Stewart, Home Bank director.

Fred W. Reynolds, former manager of the London, Ont., branch of the Home Bank, was the chief witness. He came back to Toronto in 1916, he said, to go to British Columbia and log six sections of Port McNell timber limits which were controlled by the bank.

Witness went to British Columbia, but never started the logging scheme, finding that the cost, which would have been \$250,000, was prohibitive. He came back to Toronto and Mr. Haney sent him to see Mr. Stewart. It was then decided to form a company, and Reynolds was instructed to establish an office in Vancouver, with a prosperous appearance so that a good impression would be made.

Mr. Haney visited the plant in 1917 and that year the company paid a dividend of seven per cent. The mill ran at a loss but the wholesale yard in Vancouver was a success.

In 1922 the Reynolds Company assigned and witness left its employ. Witness knew that the bank was interested in general timber limits in British Columbia. When the Reynolds Company failed it owed the bank more than \$100,000.

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
