LAST NIGHT'S DISPATCHES.

Europe.

London, Sept 2.—Salad, Solicitor for Lady Byron's family, states in the London journals that Mrs. Stowe's Atlantic Monthly article is not authentic. He states that nothing is communicated but recollections of conversations had thirteen years since, and the impression derived from communications made under great excitement. Conceding that Mrs. Stowe's narrative contains a complete account of the relations between Lord and Lady Byron, he protests against it as a gross breach of trust and confidence, as inconsistent with Mrs. Stowe's recommendations to Lady Byron, and in violation of the express terms of her will. Lady Byron's representatives and descendants absolutely disclaim all countenance of the article, which was published without their knowledge or consent. The News thinks Mrs. Stowe's article does not contain the whole truth, but is true as far as it goes. It cannot see that she has done anything beyond making a fair and valuable contribution to veracity.

London, Sept 2.—Public opinion continues sceptical in regard to Napoleon's health. The impression prevails that his real condition is concealed. This is not likely to be weakened until the Emperor himself is seen driving into Paris.

Dublin, Sept 2.—The Roman Catholic Bishops met here and adopted resolutions demanding an exclusive Catholic College endowment by the state, division of the property of royal and endowed schools, and an alteration of the Queen's College to a denominational institution, and a general land bill for Ireland.

The funeral of the Fenian Dalton took place to-day at Glasnevin. The procession had about twenty men wearing green emblems.

Canada.

Halifax, Sept. 3.—Prince Arthur left Richmond this forenoon. Salutes were fired all along the route and an address was presented to the Prince, who made a reply.

Quebec, Sept. 3.—The ship laborer's strike continues. The lower portion of town wears the aspect of Sunday. The laborers commenced to mass at Fort Mountain Hill and serious disturbances appear imminent. The troops were called out and the rioters finally dispersed in small bands.

Halifax, Sept. 4.—A sailor of the steamship Hornet made oath to-day that she had arms on board for Cuba, and the Custom officers seized her. She will discharge her cargo and coal to-day to test the truth of these being any arms under seal. The Hornet came from Philadelphia and is said to be bound for Queenstown.

Quebec, Sept. 4.—The ship laborer's strike has resulted in satisfactory arrangements being concluded between the workmen and the employers.

Purifying Cistern Water.—Cistern water becomes foul and offensive, because it contains a large amount of organic matter derived from the roofs of the houses, absorbed from the air, etc. This matter may be in the form of germs, or decay. It may be vegetable or animal, or both, the latter condition generally prevailing. This matter undergoes rapid growth and decay, and exceeding rapid multiplication. When the temperature is warm, as in the summer, there are two ways to correct the evil: First, by entire separation of all organic matter from the water; second by its complete destruction while in the water. The first object cannot always be accomplished, as no simple filter would separate germs, and even if separated the water could not be kept for use unexposed to air. An effectual method of purification is accomplished by chemical destruction. This may be completely, economically, and safely done by the permanent use of potassium, used in the proportion of about an ounce to fifty gallons of water.

As a destructive chemical change takes place, the organic matter is reduced, and the whole mass is precipitated as an inert and harmless sediment. The chemical reaction is marked by a purple coloring of the solution, and this color indicates the presence of organic matter. The permanganate should be added until this color disappears, when you may know that the organic matter is destroyed; for an infinitesimal quantity of the latter will be detected by the former. This preparation of potash may be obtained at any druggist's.—Ez.

An Agricultural Story.—A good story is told of an Amateur agriculturalist, in Berkshire county, Mass., who was advised by one of his neighbors to plant sunflowers with his beans in order to obviate the task of weeding. He followed the advice; in the course of time beans and sunflowers came up and waxed strong, the beans coiling around the sunflower stalks beautifully, and he congratulated himself upon the fact that he had discovered an effectual method of raising beans without being driven to the disagreeable necessity of toting bean poles from the forest. But alas for human expectations, his beans were raised out of the soil, roots and all, in a few weeks, by the rapid growth of his new fashioned bean poles, and there they hung withering between heaven and earth.

Halifax, Nova Scotia, Aug 31.—A paper says that the Nova Scotia coal mines are prepared to supply New York and other Atlantic markets as soon as the duty is revoked. The discussion about annexation has been renewed and the project is rapidly growing in favor. A meeting was held at Halifax to decide upon receiving the Governor General. A majority of the citizens voted to give no reception. The matter was compromised by a small number, who quietly arranged for a reception, but there was no enthusiasm when the Governor General arrived.

A gentleman was accosted on the Place Bellecour, Lyons, at midnight recently, by a decently-dressed man, who politely taking off his hat, said, "Could you, sir, be so extremely kind as to indicate to me some one of whom I could borrow two sous?" The person addressed gravely replied, "In this city there are several establishments of credit which, on the deposit of securities, will advance you the funds you require." "I thank you sir, for the information," replied the applicant, without being in the least disconcerted, "but the houses to which you allude are closed at this hour, and I have expressed need of the sum I mentioned to save me from sleeping in the street." The required amount was immediately supplied.

The Popo—Count Marini-Ferretti, the Pope's elder brother, and ten years his senior, died suddenly last week at Sinigaglia, near Ancona, where Pope Pius, who was warmly attached to him, visited him some years ago. He was a respectable old man, of simple tastes, and habits, in personal appearance very like the Pope, and in his long, closely-buttoned coat, gray pantaloons, and white straw hat of enormous proportions, was a familiar sight in his ancient haunt and daily neighborhood. He always went out unattended, and generally ended the evening in a chemist's shop, where he met a knot of friends, and discussed with them the politics of the day, particularly French politics, in which to the last he felt a warm interest.—Globe
