PORTLAND PROFITING.

A HAIR RAISER.
LONDON, July 22.—The use of kerosene as a stimulant for the hair is becoming common in Europe, and already several persons have lost their lives or been frightfully disfigured by not exercising proper care when near a fire.

SIR WILFRED IN FRANCE.
LONDON, July 23.—The Times this morning prints an account of a long interview had by its Paris correspondent with Sir Wilfrid Laurier, the Canadian premier, in which the latter said that Sir Wilfrid had been advised to forward to Sir Wilfrid Laurier, which he did. It now appears that the Hon. C. A. Geoffrey took with him to England not only Mr. Madore's resignation, as a protest against Mr. Tarte's murder, but a "round robin" signed by a dozen or more of Sir Wilfrid's supporters.

WATER COMPANY RESPONSIBLE.
PODGORJE, July 24.—The jury which has been investigating the flood caused by the bursting of the Melains dam, and which caused the death of seven people, have found the Mattawan and Fishkill Water Company responsible for the disaster.

LEAVING THESSALY.
ATHENS, July 22.—The European military authorities have ordered the surrender of the Volo-Larissa railway to the Greek railway officials within eight days. It is stated that the evacuation of Thessaly has commenced. Eight regiments of Turkish troops from Demokos passed through Thessaly to-day en route for Eleassona. Several officers have started for Salonica. Edhem Pasha is expected to arrive in 1900 shortly to superintend the evacuation.

SCOTT ACT REPEALED.
CHARLOTTETOWN, July 23.—In the election held here to re-elect the Canada Temperance Act, 673 votes were polled for 786 against, defeating the act by 113 majority. It has been in force in this province for some years and in the city some three years. Both sides worked hard.

THAT LIVELY HAIR WASH.
LONDON, July 24.—Developments at the inquest which followed the death of Mrs. Frances Sammon, whose hair was burned off as a result of petroleum hair wash being used to dress it, have caused intense interest. It appears that this wash, which is called 'Patrol,' has been very generally used of late in London. The newspapers are filled with interviews on the subject, and a question will be asked in the House of Commons with a view to prohibiting the importation of the article.

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
