The Lieut-Governor has requested me to make arrangements for soliciting subscriptions for the British Red Cross Society and the ladies of the Tipperary Club have kindly consented to take up the work, and will, in all probability, call upon you early next week for your contribution.

The Red Cross is the only institution which carries voluntary aid to our wounded soldiers and sail-ors and the work has reached such magnitude that the assistance of all loyal British subjects has be-come a necessity.
