BY-ELECTIONS ARE CALLED ON

St. John and Madawaska on June 10th—Eggs a Week Later.

FREDERICTON, May 19.—An announcement was made by Premier Foster this afternoon of the date for the three by-elections to fill vacancies in the New Brunswick legislature.

Polling will take place in St. John and Madawaska counties on Saturday, June 10th, while polling in Kings county will take place a week later, on Saturday, June 17th.

The Premier said that the later date had been fixed in the case of Kings county because of representations from that constituency, where the supporters of the government are making in convention to-day to name a candidate from among several aspirants.

Announcement was also made by the Premier of several appointments. T. M. Gaylor, former mayor of the town, was named as police magistrate of Chatham, and Norman S. Murray, of Hon. Robert Murray, former provincial secretary treasurer, and a returned soldier, was appointed registrar of probate for Northumberland county, his recommendations including one from the G. W. V. A.

BRAKEMAN KILLED AT ATHOL YARD

Crushed Between Cars and Dies From Injuries Two Hours Later.

Mr. Peter A. LeBlanc, an employee of the C. N. R. was the victim of a sad accident which occurred on the Athol yard which occurred on Tuesday afternoon.

Mr. LeBlanc was on duty with the shunter at the time. It appears that the coupling on a car which he was about to connect to the freight car was in working order.

Mr. LeBlanc somehow got caught between the coupling and the one with which he was supposed to connect it. He was rushed to the hospital but medical assistance was of no avail for his injuries were fatal. He passed away about two hours after the accident.

The deceased was thirty-one years of age, was a veteran of the famous 25th Battalion. Besides his bereaved wife, Mr. LeBlanc leaves two young children to mourn his loss. He is also survived by his parents, of this town, Mr. and Mrs. John L. LeBlanc and four sisters and three brothers. The sisters are: Mrs. Joseph Jean, of the West, Florence at the Roosevelt Hospital, in New York and Lenora at home. The brothers are Louis of Dalhousie, Patrick in the West and Frank of Campbellton.

The funeral will take place to-morrow morning at 9 a.m. and will be conducted under the direction of the Knights of Columbus. The Rev. Father Melanson will officiate and will be assisted by Father Sivert and Father James LeBlanc, a cousin of the deceased. Special music will be supplied by the K. C. Council. SEIZED VALUABLE LIQUOR SHIPMENT

Moncton Inspectors Take Charge of Eight Cases of Dry Goods.

Moncton, May 22.—Acting on notification from St. John the C. N. R. police searched a case No. 31858, C.N.R. in the yards here and discovered eight packing cases supposed to contain dry goods, all billed to Toronto.

Freight officials here were transferred the goods when Chief Hutchison seized the entire consignment at the freight shed this morning. Four cases were billed to the Dominion Cloth Co., two to the Universal Garment Co. and two to the Toronto Clothing Co., all of Toronto.

Each case contains one hundred bottles of Dewars Special Liquor and the whole consignment is valued in the vicinity of \$5,000.

The seized goods were transferred from the freight shed to the Police Station this morning. This is one of the largest seizures made in Moncton as yet.

Apparently the St. John C. N. R. police only got a part of the consignment which was to have lubricated dry gulleys in the Queen City and which through the vigilance of Chief Tingley and his department and the prompt action of Chief Hutchison of Campbellton, Delima in the West, Florence at the Roosevelt Hospital, in New York and Lenora at home.

BOOM HAND LOST HIS LIFE

Fell from Boom and Was Drowned—Body Sent to Home at Doaktown.

The boomhouse at Athol was the scene of a sad tragedy last Saturday afternoon when Hugh Parker of Doaktown, a young man of about eighteen years of age was drowned while at work on the boom.

The unfortunate young man lost his footing and fell into the river just a few minutes after the crews had begun work after the dinner hour. There was but one man anywhere near at the time and it was several minutes before he could reach the drowning youth.

It is presumed that contact with the cold water so soon after eating must have brought on a cramp which completely disabled the boy, for having once sank he did not resurface, and consequently, it was several minutes before his rescuers could locate the body.

As soon as the seriousness of the accident was realized Dr. MacPherson was called. The doctor made a record trip, covering the distance to the boom in an incredibly short time and arriving just as the boy's body was recovered. But all that medical skill could do was of no avail as the youth had been under the water for nearly fifteen minutes.

A memorial service for the deceased was held in the church at Ferguson Manor last Sunday.

The young man's remains were forwarded to his home in Doaktown on Monday's limited.

TOWN COUNCIL BOYS TRUCKS

One Ton Trucks Ordered to be Purchased for Street Work.

A special meeting of the Town Council was held at the Mayor's residence last Thursday evening. His Worship Mayor McKay presiding. Couns. St. Onge, Moores and Gilker were present.

His Worship explained that the meeting had been called to consider the advisability of purchasing motor trucks for street work. He said that a large amount of work was planned for this year. Besides the laying of concrete sidewalks it was agreed in committee that the permanent street from the subway to Sugarloaf Street should be undertaken this year. It had also been decided to lay a concrete base for this. The town had already purchased a concrete mixer and the committee had decided to do all the work by days work, under the management of a competent man.

Coun. Moores spoke in favor of purchase of two light trucks and moved that the town purchase two small motor trucks.

Coun. St. Onge spoke strongly against the purchase of motor trucks. Light trucks were forever getting out of commission and cost more to operate. Four teams could do as much work. Labor was cheap and plenty of men looking for work. Gravel could be delivered for \$1.00 per yard from the pit to any part of the town.

Coun. Moores said a truck would do the work of five horses and carts. On the vote being taken it was as follows:—

Yes—Moores and Gilker. No—St. Onge.

Mr. A. Gillis, the Ford dealer was present and offered two Ford ton trucks with steel lined dump bodies at \$1,100 each.

The Clerk read prices of International ton truck \$2,500; Federal two ton, \$4,600; Graham 1 1/2 ton \$2,500. Coun. Moores moved that town procure two Ford trucks.—Carried. Coun. St. Onge voting nay. The Council then adjourned.

C. A. Hayes Announces Proposed Cut of Sixteen or Seventeen P. C.

Ottawa, May 22.—Replying to questions from New Brunswick members, C. A. Hayes, vice-president of the Canadian National Railway this morning informed the special House committee on railway transportation costs, that the C. N. R. proposed a cut of 16 or 17 p. c. in the freight rates on lumber.

President Beatty, of the C. P. R., giving evidence on Friday, suggested a cut of 11.70 p. c.

MANY PERISH IN S.S. COLLISION

British Steamer Egypt Sinks And French Steamer Badly Damaged.

Brest, France, May 22.—Nearly one hundred perished Saturday night when the Peninsula and Oriental Line steamer Egypt sank off the Island of Usant after collision with the French freight steamer Seine.

The Egypt sailed from London for Bombay, Friday with 44 passengers and a crew of 290. A roll call on board the Seine after the disaster showed that at least fifteen of the passengers and eighty of the crew of the Egypt were missing.

The collision occurred during a dense fog within twenty-two miles of the Armen lighthouse. The dinner table was about to be stounded on board of the Egypt. Many of the passengers and most of the men were on deck. The shock threw persons into the sea, others jumped, and a number went down with the ship, which sank in twenty minutes. The Egypt was rammed amidships on the port side.
