Consideration of the bill was postponed in order that the minister of justice might be consulted with regard to certain provisions of it. The following bills were also held over in order to consult the minister of justice, as it is supposed they may come within the purview of the local legislatures: An act to incorporate the Winnipeg and Springfield bridge company; an act to incorporate the Rainy River improvement company. The following bills were passed with slight amendments: An act to incorporate the Quebec timber company; an act to incorporate the Edison electric light company.
