CONFIDENT OF SUCCESS. GEN. WOLSELEY RELIEVES IN DECISIVE VICTORY.

Arabi Strengthening Mis Position-His Military Movements Artifiery Duel Near Cairo-Trial by Tortare Lord

LONDON, Sept. 4-Though Gen. Wolseley oes not require a third division the government is determined to strengthen his hands by sending three battalions of infree without leaving a garrison of less than, men for each regiment at the front with Gen. Wolseley will also be formed at Alexandria, and a large depot of a thousand reserve men will be formed to replace these as they are drafted to the front to supply casualties. The result of these measures will be that Gen. Wolseley will have 22,-000 men on the main line of operation, besides the garrison of Alexandris and the Indian contingent.

ALL QUIET AT THE FRONT. Gen. Wolseley telegraphs from Ismalia, 'All quiet at the front. The Highland brigade will remain afloat to furnish working parties here. I am clearing out the hospitals and sending away the wounded and serious cases of sickness in the troop

ship Malabar." LORD CHARLES BERESFORD. ALEXANDRIA, Sept. 4-Some surprise is caused here by Gen. Wolseley's refusal of the khedive's request that Lord Charles Beresford should accompany his staff dur-ing the operations in the interior. Lord Beresford is the correspondent of a New York paper, and it is believed that Gen. Wolseley's refusal, is due to the fear that he might criticise the handling of the troops in his telegrams to foreigh papers.

A SPY ARRESTED. Great uneasiness is felt in consequence of the arrest of a native spy, carrying a letter addressed to Antonio Paulo, the Greek consular agent at Siocet, who is staying here. Paulo has been arrested, and it is rumored that the police have discovered several Greeks are implicated, the object being the massacre of all the Europeans in Alexandria in the event of the British troops being seriously engaged at Ramleh.
