CONFIDENT OF SUCCESS.
GEN. WOLSELEY RECEIVES IN A
DECISIVE VICTORY.

Arabi Strengthening His Position—His
Military Movements—Arabi's Position
Near Cairo—Tribes by Tassara—Lord
Dufferin's Diplomacy.

LONDON, Sept. 4.—Though Gen. Wolseley
does not require a third division the govern-
ment is determined to strengthen his
hands by sending three battalions of in-
fantry, so that General Wood may be set
free without leaving a garrison of less than
5000 at Alexandria. Reserve details of 150
men for each regiment at the front with
Gen. Wolseley will also be formed at Alex-
andria, and a large depot of a thousand
reservemen will be formed to replace these
as they are drafted to the front to supply
casualties. The result of these measures
will be that Gen. Wolseley will have 32,
000 men on the main line of operation, be-
sides the garrison of Alexandria and the
Indian contingent.

ALL QUIET AT THE FRONT.
Gen. Wolseley telegraphs from Ismailia,
"All quiet at the front. The Highland
brigade will remain aloft to furnish work-
ing parties here. I am clearing out the
hospitals and sending away the wounded
and serious cases of sickness in the troop
ship Malabar."

SEARCHING FOR REMAINS.
The Indian cavalry and a detachment of
the Royal Irish dragoon guards scoured the
country between the camp at this point and
Mansara, and returned without seeing any
remains of the Bedouins.

AN IMPORTANT MISSION.
PORT SAID, Sept. 4.—Abdullah Bey
Fahsi, aide de camp to the khedive, has pro-
ceeded on a mission to the ports of the Red
sea to stir up among the natives a loyal
feeling toward the khedive and encourage
their operations against Arabi from that
quarter.
