Few Londoners, possibly not more than 25, viewed the partial eclipse of the moon at 4.40 o'clock this morning. Even those sufficiently interested to climb out of bed and hie themselves out-of-doors to view the phenomenon. received but little return for their

In fact, London as a whole was not aware this partial eclipse was taking place. The people were content to remain in bed after a merry holiday and let the eclipse take its course. There seems to be no doubt that the eclipse came off as predicted. According to those who made the supreme effort to get out of bed at this hour it was hazy and the partial obscurity visible clearly only through glasses.
