if it were once well fettled, not only these might be advanced (the latter to more than double its present Amount, and the former without Bounds, as the Forests cover the whole Face of the Country) but also a new and most advantageous Trade be opened in the several Articles of Tillage before enumerated; beside what more might be struck out, upon Experience, and a better Knowledge of the interior Parts of the Country.
