Zarish Jotes.

Lent, with all its preparation, and Easter, with all its sense of fulfilment, are once more things of the past. We are the better or the worse for them; we cannot recall them. The services during Lent were, on the whole, well attended, and the addresses most helpful. In Holy Week sermons were given every night, and on Maundy Thursday a special service of preparation for Holy Communion was held, with an address by Rev. E. C. Cayley. On Good Friday there was the usual morning service, after which many members of the congregation attended the Three Hours' Service at St. Stephen's Church. In the evening the Rev. M. M. Fothergill gave a ten minutes' sermon on the group of mourners round the cross.

The decorations on Easter Sunday were of a simple character consisting chiefly of yellow daffodils and white lilies. The Chancel Guild issued no special appeal for contributions to the flowers, trusting to the thoughtfulness of the congregation. It does not do, however, to be too confiding in these matters, and the Guild, which is a youthful organization, will soon have few illusions left.

The Easter music was very beautiful this year and the anthem quite perfect. Miss Beverley Robinson sang the solo in it, and also sang during the offertory, "I know that my Redeemer liveth." The music and words of the anthem were paid for by the members of Miss Madeline Cayley's class.
