Page 6, lines 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6 and 7. Strike out sub-clause 5.

The said clause, as amended, was again read and agreed to.

Clauses 9 and 10 were read and agreed to.

Clause 11 was read and amended, as follows:-

Page 7, line 9. Strike out the words "and not less than two hundred dollars".

The said clause, as amended, was again read and agreed to.

Clauses 12 to 26, both inclusive, were read and agreed to.

Clause 27 was read and amended, as follows:-

Page 13. Strike out lines 35, 36, 37, 38, 39, 40 and 41, and substitute the following in lieu thereof:—

"(a) That during the period of twelve months next preceding the coming into force of the relevant Part of this Act on, in, or in respect of the Great Lakes or St. Lawrence River, or the part of Canada, or the highway to which the application for a licence relates, the applicant was bona fide engaged in the business of transport, and".

The said clause, as amended, was again read and agreed to.

Clauses 28, 29, 30 and 31 were read and agreed to.

Title again read and agreed to. Preamble again read and agreed to.

After some time, the Senate was resumed, and—

The Honourable Senator Donnelly, from the said Committee, reported that they had gone through the said Bill, and had directed him to report the same to the Senate with several amendments, which he was ready to submit whenever the Senate would be pleased to receive the same.

The said amendments were then read by the Clerk.

The said amendments were concurred in, and—

With leave of the Senate,

The Honourable Senator Dandurand moved that the said Bill be now read a third time.

After debate, it was—

Ordered, That further debate on the said motion be adjourned until the next sitting of the Senate.

The Order of the Day being called for resuming the adjourned debate on the inquiry by the Honourable Senator Ballantyne:—

That he will call the attention of the Senate to the training of naval cadets and the closing of the Naval College and also to the sale of the training ship Aurora.

It was Ordered, that the said Order of the Day be postponed until to-morrow.

The Order of the Day being called for resuming the adjourned debate on the motion of the Honourable Senator Sauvé:—

That it be resolved: That our age being evidently what some authorities call "the age of metal," as minerals are more and more sought for and used in the industries which are created or developed by the discoveries of science, as well as the new needs of social and economic activities:
