does not represent the whole empire trade because it does not also include the trade of all other British countries between themselves.

It has already been put upon Hansard that the total British empire trade amounts to 9.1 per cent of world trade. Therefore the total empire trade, including the United Kingdom's trade with empire countries, is about 9.1 per cent of the total world's trade. That means that in accepting the Ottawa agreements this government has sacrificed the chances of Canada in 91 per cent of the total world's trade for 9.1 per cent of that trade. It shows that Canada now has opportunities in only a very small fraction of the world's trade.

In sessional paper No. 127 B, of February 4, 1935, the hon. Secretary of State (Mr. Cahan) answered as follows for the hon. Minister of Trade and Commerce (Mr. Han-

Imports from the United Kingdom and other British countries were less for the twelve months ended August 31, 1931, 1932, 1933 and 1934 than for the same period in 1930; while exports to the United Kingdom were less for the twelve months ended August 31, 1931, 1932, 1933 than for the twelve months ended August 31, 1930, but greater for the same period in 1934 than in 1930; while exports to empire countries were less for the twelve months ended August 31, 1931, 1932, 1933 and 1934 than for the same period in 1930.

That means that Canada's empire trade has been much less since this government has been in power than under the previous Liberal administration. The answer of the hon. Secretary of State was to a question about exports to the United Kingdom, and his answer refers only to domestic exports and does not include Canada's exports of foreign merchandise. If the latter were included, as it should have been, it would have shown that in fact our total exports to the United Kingdom were not greater but less for the twelve months ended August 31, 1934, than for the same period in 1930.

Now I am going to give Canada's imports from and its domestic exports to the United Kingdom and other British countries for the years 1930 to 1934 inclusive, from the official return, sessional paper 127B, and others tabled the same day:

That shows that the total loss in Canada's imports from the United Kingdom from August 31, 1930, to September 1, 1934, was \$259.000,000 in round figures. That is the loss sustained in our imports from the United Kingdom. Here are our domestic exports to the United Kingdom:

There was an increase of \$35,001 in 1934 as compared with 1930, but the above table does not include the export of foreign produce from Canada, or the figures would have been considerably different. The total loss in Canadian domestic exports to the United Kingdom from 1930 to 1934 was \$215,000,000 in round figures.
