**Mr. William Rompkey (Parliamentary Secretary to Minister of the Environment):** Several departments, Crown corporations and agencies have varying degrees of responsibility in the field of water, as follows: Department of Agriculture, Department of Energy, Mines and Resources, Department of Environment, Department of Health and Welfare, Department of Public Works, Department of Regional Economic Expansion, Department of External Affairs, Department of Veterans Affairs, Department of National Defence, Department of Indian Affairs and Northern Development, International Joint Commission (some 25 of the various international boards and commissions are concerned with water), National Capital Commission, National Energy Board, National Research Council of Canada, Ministry of Transport, Ministry of State for Urban Affairs, Ministry of State for Science and Technology, Northern Canada Power Commission, National Energy Board, Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation, Department of Finance, The St. Lawrence Seaway Authority, Northern Transportation Company, Science Council of Canada, Statistics Canada.
