

## Bowling 3 Finals Decided

### BERLIN HAS THE CHAMPION RINK TORONTO TAKES OTHER FINALS

Mayor Euler Easily Disposed of Darling of Montreal—Paul of Canada Beat Percy of Victoria, While Muir of Rusholme Wins From Allen of London.

All three finals were played yesterday afternoon in the Canadian lawn bowling championship tournament. The Walker trophy was won by W. D. Euler, Berlin, the Ontario Cup by Dr. Paul, Toronto and the Toronto trophy by Rev. J. Muir, Toronto.

The main competition was a walk-over for Mayor Euler of Berlin, the Squire Darling of Montreal took a long lead the very first end. Not so for the Ontario Cup that went to the Canada after a game uphill battle. The Vice led 2-2 with two ends to go, but thereafter they only talked one. Canada tied the score with two in the fifteenth and scored the one that won in the extra end.

Rev. J. Muir of Rusholme won both his semi-final and final by one shot, and thus landed the Toronto trophy by the closest of margins.

Immediately after the finish the trophies and prizes were awarded. Sir John Willison making the presentation oration in favor of his township of Berlin. Geo. Anderson, the veteran bowler, did the honors in handing out the Ontario cup trophies. Willie W. B. Graham, the tournament chairman, made a neat address to the players.

The doubles, primary and consolation games will continue this morning at 9 at the Granite and Victoria and the Ontario trophy games at the Queen City at 11 o'clock.

## MAYES BEATS SHERWELL A DOUBLE FAULT FINALE

Interesting Games in Lawn Tennis Championships on Toronto Club Courts.

The Toronto tennis public who went to the Canadian championship tournament at the Toronto Club yesterday saw several magnificent exhibitions. Perhaps the most notable match was the contest between Sherwell, the Toronto crack, and Mayes of Winnipeg, one of the Canadian international team, from the world's tournament in England.

It took three long sets to return Mayes a winner. Sherwell took the first set 6-3 after a stubborn contest. His cross court volleys had the Winnipeg international puzzled, and he was easily over- head. Mayes is a heady player, and by clever tactics turned the tide in the second set. The third set was a long, grueling battle, Sherwell finally losing by a double fault.

In the ladies' championships all calculations were upset when Miss Best of Toronto defeated Mrs. Marty of Chincoteau in a long, hard game. The score tells its own story, the second set, 1-6, being especially noteworthy.

Greatest tennis is certainly this afternoon. Mayes plays Burns, the Toronto veteran, who is playing in old time form. Many of the sharp pick this as one of the great games of the tournament. This contest starts at 2 p.m.

The other semi-final in the open singles will be played at 4 p.m. between Baird and Allen. Allen was former doubles champion of the United States, and the Toronto man should give him a hard argument.

The ladies' doubles at 2.30 should be well worth seeing.

## DARK HORSE LEADS FOR GOLF CHAMPIONSHIP

J. Burk of Fort William Ahead in Two Rounds With the Murray Brothers Second and Third.

MONTREAL, Aug. 14.—(Staff special)—On form one might pick the new open golf champion of Canada, but as Colonel Burk may take it into his canny head to dissemble his pure guess work, there are two rounds of real hard and nerve-racking golf to be played tomorrow, before the contest is ended, and in that time would-be champions will be made and unmade.

Jack Burke, of Fort William, pure and simple dark horse, leads the thirty aspirants at the conclusion of the first day's play here today with a score of 141. This is the first time that he has ever been seen in a Canadian tournament, as he only came to Canada this spring from the States. Last year he won the inter-state championship, representative of the professional title for the states west of Chicago. He also won the Pennsylvania title a few years ago. He won by consistent and clever golfing, as his scores will show. In the morning he went out in 29, came home in 39, making a total of 74. His afternoon performance he bettered going out by one stroke, making this mark 38, and came home in 35, the best round score of the day. 73. His performance practically guarantees a duplicate one tomorrow. The Murray Brothers, Charlie and Albert, are tied for second place and either may fall off in the final struggle. Charlie tied with his assistant, A. Desjardine, for the lowest score in the morning, but added three strokes to this mark of 72 in the afternoon. Albert played consistently, his scores being 74 and 75 respectively. There are even in third place and Davey Black, Rivermead, N. Thompson, Hamilton, and R. Holden, Lambton, will have a battle royal between them, and in the meantime try to catch the leaders.

They returned cards of 163 each, only four strokes behind the leader, and their chances are very rosy.

Holden, who is only an apprentice as yet, brought home the fine card of 74 in the morning session, but he encountered a lot of trouble in the afternoon and lost three strokes. A. Woodward is still in the money, and is a dangerous man at any stage of the game. The work of Desjardine in the morning was the surprise of the day, and when the young Frenchman tied with his employer's score of 73, he was hailed by the critics as the coming champion. Unfortunately he fell down on his second round and his card of 80 only entitled him to sixth place, while the tournament was in progress.

The interest in tomorrow's play promises to be very keen and the large crowds of today are expected to be augmented by several hundreds. The scores follow:

**CHINCH BUGS ARE DRUG ON MARKET**

ST. LOUIS, Aug. 12.—The market here flooded with receipts totaling 213,000, the citizens of Carlinville, Ill., have withdrawn their offer of reward for chinch bugs. The campaign was a tremendous success.

Weeks ago the wheat in Macopin County was threatened with an invasion of the chinch bug pest, and the farmers sought means of doing away with them. Some dug trenches and others drew lines of crude oil along their fields to stop the march of the insects.

John Moorehead collected five bushels of the bugs and then Thomas Oller took in seven bushels. It cost \$2.50 to get the 26 bushels of chinch bugs buried. The bounty
