Eat Rhubarb for "That Tired Feeling"

HUBARB, or "pie-plant," is better than the best patent medicine for that tired feeling that comes each spring. This well-known plant is greatly improved by modern market gardeners. Time was when it did not come until the last of May er the first of June, but now it is ready to be made into pies, puddings or tasty sauce, early in March, and the last of April sees its price away down. It contains quinine, which gives its tart flavor, and certain salts that improve the complexion, the disposition and the digestion of those who use it.

The fact that rhubarb has such a remarkable action upon the complexion recommends it to the girls, but its bitter taste is often complained

plexion recommends it to the girls, but its bitter taste is often complained of. There is a knack in cooking the plant that should be learned; it lies in adding just a wee bit of baking soda, not more than what you can take up on the end of a case-knife blade, after the cooking is well under way. This soda neutralizes the acid, salts and bitter flavor, and it also saves on

the amount of sugar used. Stewed rhubarb—Buy bright, ruby-colored stalks, "wine plant" far-mers call this; if it is as tender as it should be you will not need to peel it. Wash the stalks and cut in inch or shorter lengths, and when a simple

syrup is boiling, drop the pieces in.

The proper proportions are three times as much water as rhubarb and half as much sugar as water. Use a cup or bowl for measuring. After the rhubarb is in and boiling briskly, add the bit of soda and simmer gently until the sauce is clear; about three minutes is long enough, for longer cooking makes it stringy. Do not stir rhubarb while it is cooking and always use a porcelain sauce pan. If the flavor of orange is liked, a strips of orange peel may be cooked with the sauce and removed when it is cold. syrup is boiling, drop the pieces in.

Because rhubarb is a laxative it is often made into other things than sauce. Stewed with figs or dates it is well liked, and rhubarb jelly is a delicious spread that would be more popular if it did not require so much sugar to make, but the soda helps here, too. Rhubarb pie is a favorite dessert with men-folk. Line deep pie tins with paste. Wash the stalks of rhubarb and cut them in thin slices. Flil the tins even full and add six heaping tablespoons of sugar. Put on the top crust and press the edges firmly together. Prick the crust with a fork or knife point to allow the steam and gas to escape, or insert a small funnel of writing paper in the crust. Bake in a moderate oven thirty minutes.


