To promote any company or companies, or for the purpose of obtaining over all or any of the property of the company, or for any other purpose which may seem directly or indirectly, calculated to benefit the company.

D) To purchase, lease, own, hire or otherwise acquire any real or personal property, or any privilege or franchise, which the company may think necessary or convenient for the purposes of its business.

E) To borrow, raise, or receive any sum of money, carry out or control any works, ways, canals or sidings, bridges, railways, wharves, docks, warehouses, stores and other works and constructions, or to do any of the foregoing, or indirectly, to advance the company's interests, and/or contribute to the same.

F) To erect, construct, improve, maintain, work, running, management, carrying out or control any works.

G) To lend money to customers and having dealings with the company, or to do any of the foregoing, or to advance by any such persons.

H) To draw, make, accept, endorse, issue, or negotiate any bills of exchange, bills of lading, warrants and negotiable or transferable instruments.

I) To sell or dispose of the undertaking of the company, or any part thereof, or to do any of the foregoing, or to think fit, and in particular for the purpose of selling or disposing of any shares, debentures or securities of any company in which the company is interested, in part similar to those of the company, if authorized so to do by the vote of a majority in number of the shareholders present or represented by proxy, or general meeting of the company.

J) To acquire the matter and holding not less than two-thirds of the issued capital stock of any company.

K) To sell, improve, manage, develop, manage, lease, dispose of, turn to account or otherwise deal with all or any of the property and rights of the company.

L) To invest the moneys of the company in any manner in which it may be deemed not immediately required in such manner as may from time to time be determined.

M) To distribute among the shareholders of the company in kind any property or interest of the company in particular any shares, debentures or securities in any company which the company may have or to dispose of.

N) To do all or any of the above objects, and all things authorized by the company, or by supplementary letters patent, as principals, agents, contractors or otherwise, and either alone or in conjunction with others.

O) To do all such other things as are deemed or conducive to the attainment of the above objects.

P) To carry out the operations of the company to be carried out throughout the Dominion of Canada and elsewhere by the name of "Business Systems, Limited," with a capital stock of five hundred thousand shares, divided into 5000 shares of one hundred dollars each, and the chief place of business of the company to be at the City of Toronto, in the Province of Ontario.
