PARIS, Aug. 28.—In announcing the government's attitude on the Moroccan fine, stationary or slightly higher question at to-day's cabinet session, Premier Clemenceau declared that Gen. Cabling from Casablanca, a correspondent of The Journal says the indications are that the Arabs are preparing for another general attack on the French forces. Everything, he continues, is being done to give them a warm reception, and wire entanglenents are being fixed around the camp. Gen. Drude, the French commander, has decided to despatch a portion of his army, about five miles south of Casablanca, to a position near Taddert. where he will endeavor to draw the Mcors into a trap
