

WORK ON THE CREMATORY

Buildings to be Reconstructed on Plans Furnished by Architect.

CLANCY WILL BUILD SIDING TO C.P.R. Toronto Railway Will Not Contribute Towards Cost of Young Street Bridge.

At a meeting of the Committee on Works yesterday afternoon the City Engineer reported again on the condition of the garbage destructor. The West End destructor is in a most dangerous condition, and it is absolutely necessary that alterations be made to it at once. Architect Denison has reported that the cost of the necessary work will be \$7000. In addition, the street Commissioner recommended that the water grate be used when the destructor is rebuilt. This would cost another \$7000-\$14,000 in all. Mr. Jones says the erection of water grates would save \$800 in coal alone. He had been to Montreal, where he had witnessed the water grates in operation, and he thought they gave entire satisfaction.

It was decided to recommend that the buildings be reconstructed on the lines proposed by Architect Denison, but that the purchase of water grates be left over for the present.

The application of Mr. Clancy for permission to construct a siding across East-avenue from the C.P.R. was granted. This is the siding that the City Engineer has been ordered to construct at once. It is to be a most dangerous condition, and it is absolutely necessary that alterations be made to it at once. Architect Denison has reported that the cost of the necessary work will be \$7000. In addition, the street Commissioner recommended that the water grate be used when the destructor is rebuilt. This would cost another \$7000-\$14,000 in all. Mr. Jones says the erection of water grates would save \$800 in coal alone.
