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

SHIFS IN SOUTHERN WATERS.

Christchurch, New Zealand, March diamonds bent.

Christchurch, New Zealand, March 3:-The steamer Morning, the Royal Geographical Society's relief ship for the Antarctic steamer Discovery, has arrived at Lyttleton, eight miles from here. She left the Discovery in Ant-arctle waters, with all well on board of her. The Discovery, Capt. R. F. Scott. R.
