

The Montreal Street Railway Co. is negotiating with the City of Montreal for a fifty years' extension of its fran-chise. Inducements have been offer-chise. Inducements have been offer-ed by the company to secure at this stage of a franchise which has still nineteen years to run a firmer grip on a lucrative monopoly. The company offered to pave a por-tion of the streets, to remove snow in winter and sprinkle the streets in sum-

tion of the streets, to remove snow in winter and sprinkle the streets in sum-mer, and sell ten tickets for a quarter during the hours of the day when the cars are used by workingmen. This offer the City Council rejected, de-manding instead an unlimited three-centage of the gross earnings.
