Tokio, Aug. 2—After two days' fighting General Kuroki has defeated the Russian forces in two separate actions fought at Yushulikzu and the Yangse Pass. The Yangse Pass, or Yang Se Pass, is situated 30 miles east of Liaoyang. The Russian army engaged there is generally known as the eastern army, and was commanded by the late Lieut. Gen. Count Keller, who was killed by the explosion of a shell.

St. Petersburg, Aug. 2.—It is officially announced that the Russians have fallen back from Yangse Pass, but are holding their positions on the Saimatsza road, and at Haicheng yesterday.

Liaoyang, Aug. 2.—After a fierce battle the eastern Russian force has evacuated Ygantseuling, six miles west of Motine Pass.
