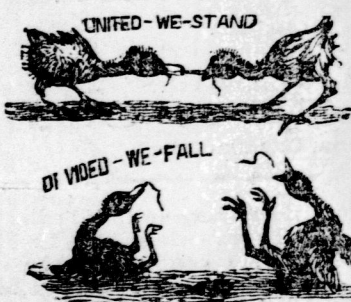

Toronto, June 23—8 p.m.—The tem-
perature today has been higher than
yesterday in all parts of the Dominion,
especially in Southern Ontario, where
it has ranged between 85° and 90°. Showers
have occurred in Quebec and Manitoba,
but in the Dominion generally the weather
has been fine. The outlook is favorable for fine, warm
weather everywhere except in the Maritime
Provinces, where with south-
erly winds there will be fog and light
local showers. Minimum and maxi-
mum temperatures: Victoria, 48-70;
Kamloops, 56-62; Calgary, 40-72; Ed-
monton, 44-80; Winnipeg, 48-70; Port
Arthur, 50-60; Toronto, 52-88; Ottawa,
56-80; Montreal, 56-80; Quebec, 48-65;
Halifax, 48-68.

Local temperatures.—The highest and
lowest readings of the thermometer at
the observatory here on Friday, June
23, were, Highest, 87°; lowest, 55°.
Today the sun rises at 4:33; sets at
8:03. Moon rises at 9:05 p.m.; sets at
5:41 a.m.

A BRILLIANT LONDON DOCTOR.

back with the degree of F. R. C. S.,
London, England. Not more than four

tinction, and seldom indeed has the

CHARGED WITH ASSAULT.
Albert Kersey and Wm. Dale, em-
ployees of the Bryanton sawmill, were
arrested at that place yesterday by
High Constable McLeod and County
Constable Corsant. Kersey and Dale
are alleged to have been members of
a gang who called at the residence of
John Corsant, of London township, at
an early hour on the morning of April
29 and brutally assaulted Corsant and
his son Henry, and then set fire to
the house. John Alexander, another
employee of the mill, was also wanted,
but he took to the woods when the
officers appeared. Kersey and Dale
will appear before Squire Smyth on
Friday next.

MEN'S MEETING AT THE AUDI-
TORIUM.

The attendance at the men's meeting
held in the Y. M. C. A. parlors last
night was not large, owing, no doubt,
to the excessive heat. The chair was
taken by Rev. J. H. Moorhouse. "Some
Features of Today" was the subject of
an address by Rev. C. R. Gunne, M.A.,
of Parkhill. He said that the multi-
plicity of societies was tending to
break up homes. Good though these
societies might be, they had a tendency
to evil.

Rev. J. T. Kerrin, of Mitchell, spoke
on "The Life That Now Is." The
reverend gentleman stated that the
great need of mankind was for higher
ideals, and that men should strive to
become Godlike in their everyday life.
Rev. T. G. A. Wright, of Millbank,
closed the meeting with prayer.

ARMSTRONG
NOT GUILTY

Was Charged With Placing an Explosive
on the Street Car Track.

Squire Lacey yesterday discharged
Winfield Armstrong, who was alleged
to have been a party to the placing of
an explosive on the street railway
tracks just east of the city limits on
Dundas street.

Mr. Armstrong was a motorman,
but has been working on a farm near
the asylum since the strike. Andrew
Elliott, motorman on the car which
was damaged by the explosion, swore
he saw a woman get out of Arm-
strong's rig and place something on the
rails at the point where the explosion
occurred. She then got in Armstrong's
rig again and drove east.

For the defense Mrs. Taylor, a very
respectable old lady, swore that she
was the woman who rode with Arm-
strong. He had picked her up where
the union bus had turned to go back to
the city, she desiring to go on to the
asylum. She stated that Motorman
Elliott's story that she stooped to the
track or did anything of the kind, was
untrue.

The magistrate held that the evi-
dence was not sufficient to connect
Armstrong with the case. Mr. E. T.
Essery for defense, and Mr. J. B. Mc-
Killop for prosecution.
