## THE SAD FATALITY IN BRUCE STREET

Inquiry Into Cause of Francis Bickley's Death—Employer Is Exonerated.

A coroner's inquest was held last night at the Carling street police station to inquire into the death of Francis Bickley, who was crushed in the Bruce street sewer on Tuesday, May 21. After hearing the evidence of eight witnesses the jury, which was presided over by Coroner Ferguson, brought in a verdict to the effect that in their opinion Francis Bickley's death was accidental, and exonerating his employers from all blame in the matter.

The first witnesses called were Dr. Hogg and Dr. Cowan, of South London, who conducted the post-mortem examination on the remains of the deceased. Both stated that from the results of their investigation they were sure that death had been due to suffocation, and that up to the time of suffocation the unfortunate man had been in a good state of health. 
